LIVE STOCK TRANSPORTATION. Improved Methods of Carrying Cattle. The York Daily notes that the evils the present system of live stock transporta tion are sufficiently patent to every one It is expensive, wasteful, and cruel in the extreme, and much of the fever-stricken ulcer-covered, bruised and lacerated bee is totally unfit for human consumption This constitutes the only semblance of justification for the dressed beef expedien and it is only a semblance, for, in truth as shown above, the latter involves all the evils of both systems, and promises no relief from any. But it is remarkable that the railroad companies have not since seen their own interest and that of the public in the reform of the present barbarous system by the substitution of safe and comfortable cattle cars for the shameful death pen now in use. This would put an immediate end the competition of beef. The main additions to the first cost of a beef, landed from the cars in New York, are the cost of feed, yardage and repeated handling, between his first shipping point and his market. Put him into a car, in which he remains from first to last and has his feed shipped with him, and you escape the frequent loading, unloading and the conscienceless extortion of cattle yards, which pile upon him so large a part of the price the consumer is forced to pay. He is fed and watered at ease; he lies down to rest when he likes; and he comes out-not starved, fevered and bruised, but sound and healthy, fit for slaughter and the table. He will have lost in weight less than a quarter of the loss now in curred; no part of his carcass will have to be cut out and thrown away on account of deep bruises, as now frequently happens; and one, two or three steers will not be drawn dead out of a car as is often the case to-day. These are each and all of them great economies. Either one of them would more than pay the expense of the change to an improved car. But there is still another and more important cousideration. A train of ordinary cattle cars cannot be given speed without destroying the living freight; but cars in which the animals could be separated, in which they could rest, in which they could not be bruised, or thrown under foot to be tramp led by their fellows, and from which they would not have to be unloaded to be fed and watered—with corn at \$2 per bushel! -could be put into express trains and run through on any desired time. Here might be made a saving of two thirds the time now employed-a sequel of equal consequence to the shipper and to the rail road. This alone would pay the expense of the proposed change forty times over every year. To any one of the trunk lines it would be almost equiv alent to a third track. To the cattle dealer it would be the difference between having his cattle out between Chicago and New York a week, undergoing untold sufferings, and having them out two days and a fraction well fed in comfortable cars. This is a reform which is coming, and it is passing strange that intelligent railway managers, instead of consulting their own manifest interests in its immediate adoption, should wait to be driven compelled by federal statute. This last is inevitable, unless the companies move in the near future, and this, it is unnecessary to say is, politically speaking, a very dangerous expedient. It would be the beginning of railway regulation by the federal government-the thin edge of the wedge, and very easy of insertion, because it

ble evils in question. The N. Y. Sun says on the above subject: "Butchers and housekeepers are greatly excited over the project of bringing dressed meat to New York from Texas. The butchers naturally object to the scheme but the housewives don't. Supposing even that the beef killed in Texas were not as fine food as that killed in New York, which is by no means sure, all the poor housekeeper wants is cheaper meat. As the case stands at present live cattle transported from St. Louis have to pay yard charges at Toledo, Buffalo and Albany at the rate of \$2.75 a car for feed, watering and bedding. The ox loses on an average seventy-five pounds of flesh during the journey, gets only five pounds of hay at the different halting places, and arrives in New York in an exhausted coudition, at a loss in weight and expenditure of something like \$10 per head to the shipper. A growl is being raised against the cattle yard monopoly of the railroads, and there seems to be ample opportunity for the dressed beef transportation to be come a burning question between West ern cattle shippers and Eastern railroad
