Ratiways in Pennsylvania.

Germantown Telegraph. Ten years ago the two great states of Pennsylvania and New York, although by far the most populous, the most commercial and the most industrial in the Union, stood as regards railway mileage for be hind the western states of Illinois and Ohio. This was not caused by deficient enterprise near the east, but partly by the enormous influence wielded here by the powerful trunk line railroad companies, whose capital and resources had for a long time been largely employed in obtaining control of all the leading railroads traversing the grain growing districts of the West. About five years ago, however, there began to be visible a very decided change in the situation, whereby the resources of New York and Pennsylvania were applied to the development of the internal resources of those states by a general extension of their railroad systems by the multiplication of brauches and competing lines. This movement, as regards our own state of Pennsylvania, has made particular headway, in consequence of the provisions of the new constitution nter

The result of this freedom has been the new railway to the total previously in operation. Nor has this been done in such a way as to injure the business of the companies previously in existence, since it is a matter of notoriety that their receipts, their net profits and their general trade are all higher and better now than ever before. Indeed, it is a well established fact, that while many of these lines were built especially with a view to securing the through business, the whole body of them are able to pay expenses exclusively out of the receipts from the way traffic. In view of this fact, which seems to be true also of the railways of New York state, we cannot resist the belief that two thon sand mere miles of railway might profita bly be created in our own commonwealth without injuring in any way the business of the existing system. We are very strongly inclined to believe also that while these new railways in Pennsylvania have had in view chiefly the gradual developmeut of the industrial resources, they have also in a large measure led to the increase of the area of agriculture and greatly enhanced the volume and value of the products of the farm, the orchard, the forest, the vineyard and the garden. Hence we say, let railroad building go on in this state as enterprisingly as possible

The writ was granted and made returnable in September.
