Postage on a Large Scale.

The following sound advice is given in the Poultry Monthly:

"There are many persons of moderate means who have had some little experience with breeding poultry, and who get to wondering if it will pay to breed poultry on a large scale—whether it will pay to embark in the breeding of poultry for market purposes as a business, and if it is good policy to give up a fair paying clerkship, or some business, to engage in it."

Such questions are very difficult to determine to the satisfaction of all persons concerned, for much more really depends on the person than on the business in nearly every department of human industry, and where one person may make a fortune, another undertaking another may fail, though having started with equally as good chances of success.

Poultry to be successful on a large scale, must be kept in small colonies of about fifty birds each, for many more than that number in a single house is apt to cause sickness and disease, ere long, among them.

Small flocks like that can be given more attention than larger ones, and the first approach of disorder can be seen readily and promptly checked, while there is less danger of great loss when thus kept in small flocks, as the trouble can usually be confined to the flock in which it is started, by proper and prompt sanitary measures.

"When the breeder is not too far away from large retail markets, and especially when the breeder can market them himself, thus saving commission, freight and loss, it pays best to breed and keep poultry for the eggs they produce, as eggs known to be strictly fresh are always in good demand at quite an increase in price over that received for the ordinary market eggs."

Such breeds as the White and Brown Leghorns, and birds from them, either pure bred, cross-bred or grade, as a basis, are first class egg producers; while a game cock is also valuable to breed to good common hens, producing as a rule, vigorous, active pullets, which are invariably good layers.

Those who wish to raise poultry principally for the flesh, should raise the Light Brahma, Plymouth Rock, Dark Brahma, or some of the Cochins breeds—the first two named, however, being general favorites in this respect, and also combining good laying qualities under favorable circumstances. Those who can not or will not give the poultry regular or constant attention, shelter them properly, supply proper food in liberal quantities and at frequent and regular intervals, and pay a strict attention to cleanliness and thoroughness in all the details of the management, need not expect even to succeed, not even to consider the question of loss or profits, for success and profit here means work, work, work!"

Germanism in Utah. Germantown Telegraph.

The bill which was enacted by Congress, and was introduced by Senator Edmunds, of Vermont, into a law for the reorganization of the territory of Utah and for the suppression of polygamy, has proved to be as complete a success in its operation as could have been desired by the most thorough-going Mormon. Not is it easy to see at this time how the case could have been otherwise, for the Mormons outnumber the people of all other faiths in that territory by a majority ranging from five to ten to one.

It is not necessary to go into details on this subject. The whole case against the Mormons may be summed up in a very few words. Their organization is a religious despotism, more rigid, unbending, severe and tyrannous in its operations than any other that had been known in modern times. It is, in fact, a problem that appears to be more difficult of solution than that of slavery as ever been. It has, in some respects, justified its existence by its success in planting a self-sustaining civilized state in a region that had been previously the most forbidding looking desert between the Mississippi and the Pacific. It has invariably preserved peace with the Indians in that territory. It has organized a community that appears to be industrious, temperate, religious, orderly, obedient and law abiding, except in regard to polygamy. It furnished a regiment for the armies of the republic, which rendered good service in the Mexican war. It built its section of the first great through line of railroad connecting our own city with San Francisco. When the late Col. Thomas A. Scott was vainly striving to push the Texas Pacific railroad through to the western coast, he made an agreement with the Indians in that territory to go to Arizona with a colony of Mormons, establish them on that portion of the South Pacific route, and take a contract for building the line. But the movement proved a failure and was abandoned. In like manner, some national politicians tried to use the Mormons as an element sufficiently powerful to antagonize and counteract the influence of the old Mexican organization in the territory of New Mexico, but that also failed; and these two failures seem to show that while the Mormon organization is able enough to defend itself in Utah, it has lost its aggressive power elsewhere.
