SEC. 2. Be it further enacted that the Board of Health of Lancester City, when appointed by the Court as provided for by Act of April 5, 1867, Section 39, shall have power to elect a suitable person as Health Commissioner, who shall carry out the provisions of this ordinance to preserve the health of the city, said Health Commissioner to receive such compensation as Councils may fix upon from time to time, to be paid out of the appropriation by Councils for the use and purposes of the Board of Health.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted that every physician shall report to the Board of Health. such a shall report to the Board of Health every person having smallpox, varioloid, cholera, mailgnant diphtheria and malignant scarlet lever, or any other contagious or infectious disease, and his or her place of dwelling and name, if known; such report to be made within twenty-four boars after

dwelling and name, it known; such report to te made within twenty-four hours after the development of any of the above diseases, provided such report was not previously made by some other physician.

SEC 4. And be it further enacted that itshall be the duty of every practicing physician in the City of Lancaster to report in writing to the Board of Health the death of any of his or ner patients who shall have died of any con-agious or infectious disease within twenty-our hours thereafter, and to state in such re four hours thereafter, and to state in such report the nature and type of the diseare.

SEC 5, And be it further enacted that the keepers of all hotels and boarding houses having any person or persons in their hotels or boarding houses subering from or afflicted with any contagious or injectious disease, such as mentioned in Section 3 of this ordinance, after they shall have been made anown of the fact, shall immediately notify the Board of Health, stating the person's name, age, residence and any other sanitary information that they may be in possession of respecting such person. Any person falling to notify the Board of Health in writing within twenty-four hours of such case or cases of contaging a fact the state of the state. four hours of such case or cases of conti-gious or infectious disease, after having b

gious or infectious disease, after having become aware of the fact, shall be subject to the
penalties hereinatter named in section 12.

SEC. 6. And be it further enacted that no
person shall, within the City of Lancaster
carry or remove from one building to another
any person sick of any contagious or infectious disease without a permit from the Board
of Health. of Health. SEC. 7. And be it further enacted that all bodies of persons who shall have died of any contagious or intectious disease as mentioned to Section 3, of this ordinance, shall be buried within twenty-four hours after death, unless xtension of time shall have been granted by he Board of Health.

that whenever the Board of Health deem it expedient to properly vaccinate the citizens of Lancaster, they may, with the advice and consent of the canitary Committee, appoint vaccine physicians to fully carry into effect this part of this ordinance.

BEC, 11. And be it further enacted that whenever any citizen of Lancaster what to give information of the existence of a nuisance in any part of the city he or sheshall be required to hand such complaint in writing over his or her own signature to the Health Commissioner or Secretary of the Board of Health, such complaint to describe the nature of the nuisance, the location and the name of the occupants or of owner or owners of sance, the location and the name of the oc-cupants or of owner or owners of properties upon which it exists, and also if any person or persons shall publish or make known by rumor or report, mischievously or otherwise, the existence of any malignant, contagious or injectious disease in the city of Lancaster, which does not exist, such person shall be subject to such fines and penalties as shall be hereafter prescribed in Section 12 of this ordinance.

SEC. 12. And be it further enacted that any SEC. 12. And be it further enacted that any physician or persons who shall violate, disco-bey, neglect or refuse to comply with, or who shall resist any of the provisions of this ordi-nance, shall be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 for each offense, said fines to be collected as other fines are collected by the Board of Health, before any alderman of the city of Lancaster, and the same turned over to the City Treasurer, except that the penalty for refusal to vaccinate shall not exceed \$19, and provided, also, that the fines mentioned in section 5 shall not exceed \$10. SECTION 5 Shall not exceed \$10.

SEC. 13, All ordinances or parts of ordinance inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.
