CATTLE RANCHES.

BREEDING AND RAISING STOCK.

In the Far West-Water and Grass-Kecording the Brand-Herds Running Astray for a Year.

A number of gentlemen interested in argiculture, forming an association popularly known as the "New York Farmers," are in the habit of dining together at in tervals during the season when they are residents of the city instead of being scat tered at their summer villas in the country. The record of the addresses at these dinners the past year has just been published. One read at the meeting on March 19th, was by Mr. Thomas Sturgis of Cheyenne, who was introduced as "re-presenting 60,000 head of cattle." We give below some extracts from his re

This business of cattle ranching is noth ing more or less than the breeding and are turned over to the owners of the raising of animals without shelter and respective brands. That process is carried without prepared food. That is the only way in which it differs from your way of of the same name. There the rancheria is the farm buildings, and ranchero is the man who owns them; and the Mexicans ranchman to gather on his own ranchman to gather them. have given us most of our nomenclature. Our men are vaqueros, and they rejoice in the title, for it is that of skilled cow herder; the pens into which we turn our cattle are corrals, and the rope they throw over their horses is a lariat or riata.

My attention was first called to this method of cattle raising by my eminent failure in another direction. Some fifteen years ago, my partner and I settled on the border of the Indian territory, and I traded for their cattle with Choctaws, Chickasaws and Creeks. The first winter we lost 267 head out 300, owing to the frozen rains to which the animals were subjected, and to which they were not accustomed. This fixed in my mind the fact which I am ready to formulate as an axiom, that for the handling of cattle without shelter, the first perquisite is a climate in which cold and rain do not co exist. Cattle will stand extreme of either but not together. And I speak carefully when I say "extremes;" for my own experience shows, and is borne out by that of others, that cattle will bear any extreme of dry cold to which they are likely to be exposed in the United States. I was at Fort Garland, in the San Luis Valley, in 1873, and the post trader told me that his beef cattle had been repeated ly subjected to a temperature of 45 degrees below zero, and yet during all that time he was able to supply beef cattle of good quality to the post. Since that time, I have repeatedly seen my own cattle exsed to a temperature of 20 degrees or 30 degrees below zero, for three weeks to gether without any perceptible injury. have seen calves born at that temperature get up and draw their sustenance at na ture's fount without any of the functions of mother and calf being disturbed. That is due to the absolute dryness of the climate throughout the section of country I refer to. When the hide is dry, there is no loss of animal warmth to speak of; but, if you wet the hide and expose the animal to an ordinary degree of cold—say freezing point or even above—the loss of vital ity takes place very rapidly and death ensues. The area of country over which this grazing is possible is much larger than is ordinarily supposed. You may say, roughly speaking, that all of the country from west of the one hundredth degree of longitude to the Pacific, and from old Mexico to the British possessions is available for the handling of cattle in this way. I will except, however, from that such portions of the mountains as are above an elevation of 7,000 feet, for there will be too much fall of snow, and also such portions of the plateaus as are below 3,000 feet, for there the moisture and dampness will crust and freeze over the snow and defeat the object which we wish to accomplish. That covers Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon and Washington territories. The southern territories of New Mexico and Arizona

The theory of the "round up" is based upon the fact that cattle must always go to water at least once in the twenty-four hurs, and that usually from ten o'clock in the morning to four o'clock in the afternoon. Therefore, between those hours you will undoubtedly find all the cattle in the cer-
