THE CONDITION OF THE CHOPS. Pavorable Reports From All Sec

Heavy Rainfalls-Clover as a Fertilzer-Care of Urcharde, &c. A stated meeting of the Lancaster county agricultural society was held in their room in City hall, yesterday afternoon. The following named members were present: H. G. Rush, president, West Willow: Calvin Cooper, Bird in-Hand; Josoph F. Witmer, Paradise; Henry M. Engle, Marietta; James Wood, Little Britain; S. P. Eby, city; Casper Hiller, Conestoga; J. G. Rush, West Willow; M. D. Kendig, Creswell; C. L. Hunsecker, Manheim township: P. S. Reist,

Calvin Cooper, from the committee ap pointed to visit and represent the society at the late meeting of the trustees of the state agricultural college, read a long printed report of his experiences en route and at the college.

Crop Reports.

Reports on the condition of the crops being called for, several farmers responded, all of whom gave substantially the same testimony, namely, that the hay crop was one of the largest ever gathered, but that the grass was too rank to make hay of the best quality; the wheat was well filled and well gathered in; and yielded from 18 to 35 bushels per acre; the oats was generally good, but in a tew localities affected by smut; early potatoes very good and the potato bee:1: not troublesome ; the corn growing rank, and slow in shoot ing ears, and that which was planted on hillsides badly washed by the heavy rains; young clover very luxuriant, second crop clover very slow in coming into bloom and a rather poor prospect of seed; pasture abundant and of fine quality; tobacco equal to any ever grown, but in some localities badly cut by hail and damaged by high winds, and in low, wet grounds, somewhat affected by rust; apples generally very poor, the fruit dropping off and being greatly injured by insects; pears promise a full crop, but many varieties are badly cracked; peaches in some localities very good and in others scarce, the crop being on the whole below an average; grapes a full crop, but suffering from mildew in some localities; plums in some localities pretty good, but generally a fail ure, rotting before they ripened.

The rainfall at Marietta for June was reported at 6 6 10 and for July 41 inches. At Cresswell, Manor township, the rainfall for June was reported at 6 4 5 inches. The president remarked that a year or two ago when we were suffering from drouths, the trouble was attributed to the cutting away of our forests and it was seriously proposed that the planting of forests would soon become necessary and that legislation would be required to save them. The great rainfalls of the present season would seem to disprove the theory that drouths were caused by cutting away the forests.

A discussion sprang up as to the proper Some thought it should be plowed under when green and juicy, and others that it druggist, 137 and 139 North Queen street. was better to wait until it had gone to seed; but all agreed that clover was a valuable fertilizer whether green or ripe.

S. P. Eby wanted to know if there was no remedy for the rotting of plams before they were ripe, and Casper Hiller answered that there was not; the rotting being due to atmospheric conditions over which man had no control. H. M. Engle which man had no control. H. M. Engle agreed that the atmosphere had much to do with rotting the fruit, but believed that the trouble might in a great measure be overcome by selecting certain varities of plums that are not effected by the atmosphere. He had seen two varieties of plums growing side by side one of which rotted and the other matured. The question whether it would be ad-

visable to cultivate southern varieties of apples for winter use was discussed, and it was agreed by all that our native apples are preferable-especially the York Imperial, the Winesap, the Pennock, the Smokehouse, Smiths' Cider and the Romanite. A rambling discussion on apple culture followed, participated in by Casper Hiller, Henry M. Engle, S. P. Eby, Eph. S. Hoover, J. G. Rush, Joseph F. Witmer and others. Some of the measures proposed were to cultivate the orchards by frequent plowing and manuring to wash the trunks of the trees with soap suds or lye; to turn the swine and chickens into the orchards to eat the wormy fruit and the insects that infest the trees; to plant the trees only in clay loam; to use grafts from young and healthy trees only. and to see that the young trees from the nursery have an abundance of good roots to look out for new and valuable varieties of seedlings, and to disseminate them in lieu of old and deteriorated varieties. Mr. Hoover suggested that the coddling moth might be trapped by placing lights with a tub of water under them in the orchards or building fires that would attract and kill the insects. Mr. Engle thought it would be better to carefully examine the securing good fruit.

On motion of Mr. Cooper the secretary ras notified to be present hereafter at all was notified to be present hereafter at all meetings of the society, or in case of absence to send to the meeting the minutes of the last preceding meeting.

Mr. Eby asked, "What do moles eat?" and Casper Hiller answered that be had seen many upheavals by moles in gardens and flower beds, but he had never known them to eat or injure bulbs or plants. But they do a good deal of damage by upheaving the ground and by making safe paths for mice which do injure the plants.

Messrs. Hiller, Eogle, Reist and Eby exhibited before the society some fine apples and pears. A committee was appointed to test and report on them and awarded to Mr. Hiller a premium for the largest collection and to Mr. Engle : premium for the best plate of fruit.

Mr. Eby read a newspaper article rela-tive to fertilizers, which provoked some discussion by Messrs. Hiller, Cooper, Engle and Rush. Adjourned.
