SEEK OUT THE MONEY.

Enforcing Payment of a Debt at the Point of a Pistol.

A highly sensational incident of the Beaver savings bank failure on Thursday has come to light. Some time ago a Mrs. Ubalto, the widow of one of the soldiers of the famous Light Brigade, sold some of her property and deposited \$700 with the bank. On Thursday morning Mrs. Ubalto heard some rumors to the effect that the institution was not solvent, and would probably suspend in a day or two. She is a very energetic woman, and has a pretty fair knowledge of business affairs, and she determined to act promptly.

Accordingly she went at once to the bank, where she found William McCreey, the president. She was accompanied by her son, who is about twenty-one years of age, and therefor a demand for the money. Mr. McCreey said that the bank had failed and that the failure would be announced the next day. Owing to this, he told her that he could not pay her the money, but said she must take her chance with the other creditors and get the same proportion that they did.

This excited Mrs. Ubalto very much, and turning to her son she told him to go to the house and get a pistol. She gave her instructions in such a low tone that Mr. McCreey did not hear what she said and he did not suspect anything until the young man returned with a Derringer, which he handed to his mother. She promptly cocked it, and pointing it at Mr. McCreey she reiterated her demand for the money, saying she would shoot him if he did not comply.

Mr. McCreey tried to appease Mrs. Ubalto, but she would not listen to him, and her son intimated that he was fully prepared to back up his mother's claims. The result was that Mr. McCreey went to the safe where he kept his greengroceries, counted out the \$700 and gave it to the widow. She received it without a word and handed it and the pistol to her son and then, in true feminine fashion, fainted dead away upon the bank floor.

The boy assisted his mother home after she revived, but she was so excited and treated by the exciting events of the morning, that she kept very quiet, but it leaked out. The liabilities of the bank are not more than \$30,000, and it is stated on good authority that every dollar of this will be paid.

Commercial Matters.

The annual report of the board of trade of Cincinnati shows that the product of the manufacturers of that city, during the last year, amounted in value to \$194,372,000, an excess of \$8,000,000 compared with the product of the preceding year.

The exports of petroleum for the twelve months which ended June 30th last, amounted in value to \$44,913,079, against \$51,283,704 for the 12 months which ended June 30, 1882.

The first national bank of Olympia, W. T., and the first national bank of East Portland, Oregon, have been authorized to begin business, each with a capital of \$50,000.

A collapsed strike. The strike of the Pittsburg, Cincinnati and St. Louis railway telegraph operators collapsed on Saturday morning as suddenly as it began, all but ten of them returning to work. It is reported that during Friday night seventy-one telegraph lines were broken or grounded around New York city, that fifteen wires were cut or rendered useless near Pittsburg, and that several wires were also cut near Chicago and St. Louis. The striking telegraphers deny that they are responsible for this.
