Hartsook, sub-professors in the Virginia military institute, were arrested in Lynchburg on Saturday, and held to keep the peace, under an appre-hension that they were about to fight a duel.—Charles Ingram was shot and perhaps fatally wounded by his brother in law, C. W. Richardson, in Cincinnati, on Friday night. They had been in the habit of quarreling on family matters.—John Tudor fatally shot Mrs. Nancy Judson, colored, who was depredating in his watermelon patch, near Lexington, Ky., on Friday night.

CAUGHT IN A WHIRLPOOL. A New Jersey Farmer Drowned While Bath

ing at Como. A jolly party of pleasure scokers numbering about twenty young ladies and gentleman came from Freehold, N. J., and vicinity by carriages to enjoy a day's picnic at Como, a new resort adjoining Ocean Beach on the south. Soon after arriving a few of the party entered the surf for a bath ; two of the gents, becoming hilarious, ventured away from the rest and were approached by a very small size whirlpool or "sea puss."

One with difficulty avoided it, but the other, becoming frightened, was caught in it and carried immediately under and drowned, despite the brave efforts made by his companions to save him.
