Events near and across the County Lines.
West Chester extinguishes all its street lights at or before 10 o'clock every night.

It is proposed to construct in the city of Reading by English capital, a system of sewerage for drainage of water closets, to cost \$200,000. The money will be furnished provided 6 per cent. interest is guaranteed.

Excitement runs high, and threats of lynching are made.
