Nearly an Entire Block Borned-\$100,000 Loss. Shortly before eight o'clock last evening tire broke out in the lumber yard of Jas. iill, No. 1168 North Third street, Phila delphia, which, before it could be subdued, spread nearly over the entire block bounded by Third, Canal and Charlotte streets and Girard avenue, destroying totally the lumber yard property, nearly the whole of the Eagle iron works of the

Messrs. Hoff & Fontaine, and damaging to a greater or less extent some dozen smaller houses adjoining.

The fire had gained a tremendous head way before the firemen were able to puttheir apparatus into use. The Girard avenue front of the block is occupied by a row of three story stores and dwellings, the property of Messes. McNeely & Co.

Back of these and extending from Third to Charlotte street, is Gill's lumber yard, and in the rear of this, fronting on Canal street, is the Eagle iron works. In a very short space of time the main buildings belonging to the latter establishment were enveloped by the flames, the fire also extending in the opposite direction toward the Girard avenue houses, as well as three or four buildings on Third street, between the lumber yard and Girard avenue. The lumber yard was stocked with a

by the owner at from \$25,000 to \$30,000, upon which there was \$7,000 or \$8,000 insurance. The main foundry building of the Eagle iron works, a three story structure, used as a machine and pattern shop, was entirely burned, together with the one story building used for the foundry proper.
