POISON IN GEORGIA.

An Attempt to Kill a Whote Family—Some Fatal Cases. An epidemic of poisoning seems to have fallen upon Georgia. A recent attempt at killing a whole family at Churkee campmeeting narrowly tailed. In the case in Rome a negro poisoned nine persons, three of whom died, and the culprit is held for murder for the poisoning of Mrs. Barnwell and child, resulting in the death of the child. Maggie Harris, a colored woman of Gordon county, will be hanged October 19. Her confederate, a negro named Dukes, has been sentenced to the penitentiary for life. The last attempt is reported from Chiciasaw-Hatchie, Terrell county, in which a negro named Wesley Williams attempted to poison the family of J. W. McMillan, his employer. Monday morning Mrs. McMillan was sick and Williams volunteered to cook the break fast. Later the lady went out to the kitchen and noticed something peculiar in the coffee. Mr. McMillan and T. J. Pel-

ham both sipped it and became deathly sick. Meanwhile Williams, who was on the lookout, discovered he had been caught, and so he ran for the woods. vestigation revealed the fact that half a rob the house. Mrs. Sadler ran into the street in her night clothes and was followed nearly a block by her husband.
