SHOTTERED IN OATS.

A Grains Floor gives way and kills four men. A special to the Minneapolis Tribune from Moorhead, Minn., says: A dreadful accident occurred Tuesday night at the farm of Mr. Northrup, eight miles east of Minneapolis, in which four men were killed outright and 10 more narrowly escaped with their lives.

The 14 men were members of a threshing crew, who had been threshing for Mr. Northrup the day before. They were sleeping in the lower story of a granary, on the upper story of which were stored 1,400 bushels of oats. During the night, while all the men were asleep, the floor suddenly gave way, and the falling oats completely buried eight men who were sleeping at the end of the building where the floor first gave way.

The other six, who were sleeping at the other end of the granary, were partially crowded through the side of the house, which gave way under the sudden pressure of the descending grain, and made their escape without serious difficulty. After giving the alarm they set to work to release their buried comrades. When the unfortunate men were finally reached four of them were dead from suffocation, their mouths, ears, eyes and noses being stuffed with oats, and some of the others were so nearly dead that it was a matter of doubt for several hours whether they would live or not.

The dead are: Andrew Larson, Charles Vin, R. A. Rhodes and another whose name is not known.

A Troublesome Question.

This is the question that troubles a French justice of the peace. A drover and a butcher in the market adjusting their accounts went to a tavern to dine together. During the meal the butcher took from his pocket a bank note of 100 francs value, whereupon he paid the drover, but in handing it over let it fall in a dish of gravy. The butcher's dog accepting the movement as a friendly invitation, and liking the smell of the saturated note, made a spring at it and swallowed it. The butcher was furious. "Give me my money," he demanded. "Kill the dog and open him." "Not by a blamed sight," replied the drover. "My dog is worth more than 100 francs." Then I owe you nothing. Your dog has collected for you before witnesses. "My dog is not my cashier. And besides, where is your receipt." The justice will have to settle this. "Let him." And now for week the justice has vainly been seeking law on precedent for such a case, and the townsmen have been on the verge of a quarrel over it again and again.
