A SUNDAY IN LONDON. IMPRESSIONS OF CHURCHES, ETC. A Sermon by Spurgeon and His Appearance at the Palace of Westminster.

In the central part of the city, in the neighborhood of Russell and Bedford squares, lodgings may be had, especially in the summer months, adapted to every taste and pocket.

I did as I suppose many European tourists do--made London my headquarters, from which I made excursions to Paris, to Germany, and other places of interest.

I had for my companion that morning Professor, a fellow lodger whose acquaintance I had made some days before.

As we were finishing our meal, I asked me whether I would go to church, informing me that there would be a sermon to be held at the most celebrated preachers in London.

We started early, hoping to obtain admission by ticket, in advance of the miscellaneous throng; but when we arrived in the Strand, opposite the Hall, there were already a large number of people.

After entering the hall I became separated from my friend, the professor, who was going with one stream and I with the other.

I arrived opposite the west front of St. Paul's just as the chime began to play. The "How Be It," made famous by the story of Whittington and his cat, was also ringing, and what a stir they both did make!

Presently several elderly gentlemen ascended the steps to the platform and took their seats in the front row, and I am made aware by the hushed interest that pervades the congregation that the great preacher has arrived.

It is not necessary to speak of the appearance of St. Paul's on the outside; it is familiar to every school boy; but you must not think of the steeple and spire as it looks in the picture; art has a way of softening and improving the complexion of a picture.
