A SOUTHERN MARKET,

Preliminary Meeting Held and Action Taken for its Erection. In pursuance of advertisement a large number of property owners and others re-siding in the southern section of the city met last evening at George Wall's Southern exchange for the purpose of consider-ing the feasibility of erecting a new market house in that section of the

The meeting was called to order by Ames Urban, on whose motion Dr. R. M. Bolenius was chosen chairman and James

R. Garvin secretary.

The chairman stated the object of the meeting, said the matter had for some time past been discussed by many citizens, but that no organized action had been taken. He hoped the gentlemen present would present their views without re-

Amos Urban said steps should be taken for the early erection of a market house in the southern section of the city; our neighbors of other sections have already erected fine market houses, affording excellent market facilities for their respective neighborhoods. Although we have not so much wealth in the south as they have in other sections, he had no doubt enough stock could be sold if the matter be taken hold of in the right way and proper organization and effort be made, to build a market house equal to any of the others and at a less cost, as we will have the advantage of the experience of the others. He thought stock ought to be issued to the amount of \$25,000 or \$30,000, and that there would be no difficulty in disposing of it. He believed that a market in the southern part of the city would be well maintained.

There is a larger severe of courses to the southern and stage of the city would be well maintained. There is a larger scope of country to the south of the city, tilled by thrifty farmers who have no other outlet for their produce except Lancaster, and to reach it they must traverse the southern avenues of the city. The conveniences afforded by the proposed market house would probably en-able them to sell their produce a shade cheaper than at the other market houses, and this would attract customers from other sections of the city. He moved that a committee of five be appointed by the chair whose duty it shall be to examine suitable sites for the proposed market, not farther north than Conestoga street, to as-certain the cost of site and of the erection of a suitable building, and to report the

same at next meeting.

The motion was unanimously agreed to, and the chair appointed the following committee : Amos Urban, James R. Garvin, John Ochs, George W. Cormeny and

Daniel Sing.

John Ochs moved that a list at once be prepared of persons in favor of the measure and the amount of stock they are will-ing to take. If those present at the meet-ing sign now, it will have a good impres-

George Wall thought several lists might be prepared and placed in different parts of the city, where persons could sign their names without inconvenience. The suggestion was well received, though the question was not put to the meeting.

James R. Garvin said there was no rea son why the proposed market house should not be built. It would supply a larger section of the city than any of the other market houses; the ground would cost less and the erection of the building less than either of the others, and it had a better section of the county from which to draw supplies.

The meeting adjourned to reassemble at

the same place on Wednesday next, and the secretary was directed to have the same advertised in the daily papers.

Disastrous Conflagration in Pittsburg Which Destroyed Much Property -Loss, \$55,000,

PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct., 25.-G. A. and A. S. Mundorf's planing mill on the South Side together with five two-story frame dwellings and 1,000,000 feet of lumber were burned this morning. The fire spread so rapidly that the emwere burned this morning. The fire spread so rapidly that the employes barely escaped with their lives, the fireman and engineer receiving severe burns. In twenty minutes the entire mill and dwelling and lumber were burning fiercely, and in an hour smouldering ashes only remained. The dwellings were occupied by seven families who were unable to save any of their household effects. The loss will aggregate \$55,000 on which there is no insurgate \$55,000, on which there is an insurauce on the mill and lumber of \$40,000.

Emphatic Protestations. A Schooner Sinks with Four of Her Urew. VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Oct. 25.— The schooner, William H. Rourke, sunk in Vineyard Sound and the captain and three of the crew were lost. The mate, the only survivor, clung to the vessel's upturned boat for twelve hours, finally drifting ashore at Gay Head, where he now remains in an exhausted condition.

The Railroad War. SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Oct. 25 .- The freight war continues. The Union Pacific road now charges 50 cents per hundred from the Missouri river, the same as the Denver & Rio Grande road. Merchants are availing themselves of the cut and ordering goods by telegraph. It is thought that such a radical cut cannot last long.
