

THE SMALLPOX.

SEVENTEEN CASES IN THE CITY. Who They Are and Where Located—Con- sider Largely to One Section—Neglect of the County Authorities.

A week ago there were very few cases of smallpox under treatment in this city, but the disease has increased rapidly of late. Today the total number of cases under treatment was reported at thirteen, and this morning four cases more were reported by the board of health, making seventeen cases in all. It will be noticed that more than one half of the above cases are in a single block of small houses on West Millin street, and several of the others only a short distance away; and that the block of houses named is only half a square from the house occupied by the Carr family where the disease originated last spring.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24.—Henry Smith, aged 45 a professional thief, was shot and killed by George Trenwith about nine o'clock this morning in the latter's saloon at 629 South 44th street. Smith had a quarrel with Trenwith over a trivial matter when the saloon keeper shot him in the head and he died on the way to the hospital. Trenwith who has served many terms of imprisonment for robbery and assault was locked up.

What You're Saying.
