### TARIFF TALK.

FROM DEMOCRATS EAST AND WEST.

What a Revenue Tariff, With Incidental Protection, Means-Sentiments of Statesmen and Platforms.

The recent canvass for speaker andmore especially its determination in favor of Carlisle-have started anew the discussion of the tariff question. As usual there are much light talk, misunderstanding and misrepresentation of the subject. It may be well for reasonable men of all parties to take their bearings. Especially should Democrats enlighten themselves on the subject and the attitude of their party toward it. See what its leaders and the platforms have said, and what shades of difference there are in its views :

Some of the Revenue Reformers. Ex-Governor Hendricks says : "A horizontal tariff is impossible."

Senator James B. Beck says: "Nobody asks or expect this Congress to establish free trade or to tear down custom houses ......... In adjusting taxation on imports with a view only to obtain revenue or 'for revenue only,' we never thought of discriminating against American industries, or of depriving them of the incidental benefits or protection a proper revenue tariff would afford."

Senator Bayard says : "The power to tax by laying duties upon imports may be so exercised as to do what it has done ever since the foundation of the government, and that is to give an advantage equivalent to the amount of the tax to the American producer or manufacture over his foreign competitors in the same line of production or manufacture,

and this becomes his protection." Senator Williams, of Kentucky, says: "Nobody is for free trade just now." Senator Coke, of Texas, says :

"As an inevitable consequence, domes ic manufacturers and producers of the articles upon which such revenue import duties are laid are to that extent protected against foreign competition." Mr. Carlisle, of Kentucky, in substance

citerates these sentiments. His position has been expressed thus : "In the bread and sweeping sense which the use of the term generally implies I am not a free trader. Of course that is understood. At least it should be. I will add that in my judgment it will be years yet before anything in the nature of free trade would be wise or practicable for the United States. When we speak of this subject we refer to approximate free trade, which has no idea of crippling the growth of home industries, but simply of scaling down the iniquities of the tariff schedule, where they are utterly out of proportion to the demands of that growth.

Mr. Randall's Views. Mr. Rancall, in a speech in Congress,

"I do not favor a tariff enacted upon the ground of protection simply for the sake of protection, because I doubt the xistence of any constitutional warrant for any such construction or the grant of any such power. It would manifestly be in the nature of class legislation, and to

Nobody wants direct taxation, although it would bring taxation so near and so constantly before the people that Congress would besitate long before it voted the sums of money it now does, if not for improper at least for questionable

purposes. "I believe that the arrangement of our system of tariff duties should not rest upon any partisan basis regulated by existing parties, but that, on the contrary, it should in a measure be divorced from politics and cease to be a bone of political contention in and out of Congress. It should occupy the higher level and command the best efforts of statesmanship of every party. " Metternich, one of the ablest as well

as one of the most successful prime minis ters of madern times, said: 'Statesmanship is a practical knowledge of a state' resources.' A judicious and properly laid tariff should not molest those resources, It should be framed so as to give stability our business at home and our trade Unnecessary and causaless changes are injurious as well to the revunues as to the industries and commerce of the people. Remedial measures to cure defects and equalize burdens and benefits are of the greatest advantage when promptly and properly enseted. It would be a blessing of incalculable value if we could so arrange our legislation as to readjust in the main duties on imports only once in every ten years, and then have them based upon the statistics and widest information of our census tables In this way business men in every branch

It yields a dwindling, not a yearly rising revenue; it has impoverish-ed many industries to subsidize a few; it prohibits imports that might purchase the products of American labor; it has de graded American commerce from the first to an inferior rank on the high seas; it factures at home and abroad and depleted the returns of American agriculture and industry followed by half our people; it costs the people five time more than it roduces to the treasury; obstructs the processes of production, and wastes the fruit of labor ; it promotes fraud, fosters smuggling, enriches dishonest officials, and bankrupts honest merchants. We demand that all custom house taxation shall be only for revenue.

History Repeats Itself. This passage is from James K. Polk's letter to Judge Kane, in 1844. It was upon this that the Democrats then carried ennsylvania for Polk against Clay :

"I am in favor of a tariff for revenue, such a one as will yield a sufficient amount to the treasury to defray the expenses of the government economically administered. In adjusting the details of a revenue tariff, I have therefore sanctioned such moderate discriminating duties as would produce the amount of revenue needed, and at the same time afford reasonable incidental protection to our home industry. I am opposed to a tariff for protection

merely and not for revenue. "In my judgment it is the duty of the government to extend as far as it may be practicable all other means within its power, fair and just protection to all the great interests of the whole union, embracing agriculture, manufactures, the mechanic arts, commerce and navigation. --
