THE DECEMBER ADJOURSED TERM A Week or Criminal Court-" Capt. Jinks trets 70 Days - A Case of Stolen

Stope From Columbia. Tax morning the adjourned court of quarter sessions began, with Judge Liv-ingston presiding. There are 31 indict-ments for trial and among the cases is one of murder.

W. Jenks, alais "Captain Jinks," plead guilty to carrying concealed weap one and was sentenced to 70 days in prisonment. After serving his sentence here he will be taken to New Jersey to answer a number of charges.

Com'th vs. Samuel Turner, of Columbia, receiving stolen goods. The evidence for the commonwealth showed that on the 10th of August last, 226 pounds of rope, belonging to W. A. Steep and Dearbach were put upon the stand and testified that before taking the rope they went to the house of the accused and got some bags from him telling him that they were going for rope, but did not state where. Late at night they returned to defendants and sold him the rope.

The defense admitted that they purchas ed the rope but denied that they knew it was stolen. They claimed that on this evening three young men came to Turner's house; Steep stated that they desired to borrow some bags to go out on the river for some rope. which one of the boys said belonged to them, and was attached to some fish baskets; they further stated that they desired to go to Williamsport the next morning and needed money; defendant then greed to purchase the rope that night. The jury rendered a verdict of not
