IN EUROPE.

THE OUTBREAK IN ASHANTEA, AFRICA.

CAPE COAST CASTLE, Africa, Dec. 29.—A negro in Ashantea is quiet. The people are overawed by the slaughter of the family of ex-King Koffee Kaliali and the daily massacre of his adherents, hundreds of whom have been executed. Sixty eight of his seventy children have also been killed. One of Koffee Kaliali's adherents hearing that the ex-king's life was in danger, sent 90 men to guard him. They remained several days with the king by the consent of the chief now reigning. They were then suddenly attacked and all killed. Serious charges against a senator. TREIST, Dec. 29.—Signor Zampieri, editor of the Independent, an Italian irredentist journal here, has been arrested on the charge of high treason.

An Angry Negro. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 29.—John H. Brown, a young colored man, was today committed to prison to await the result of injuries inflicted by him upon Wm. Hess, aged 13 years. Hess, with other small boys, was a nigger at Brown when he ran after them, and catching Hess, knocked him down and beat him in a brutal manner. He then picked the boy up and knocked his head against the wall. The boy's head was beaten almost beyond recognition, and it is thought he cannot recover.

A Most Deplorable Murder. CINCINNATI, Dec. 29.—William Behrman, a German aged 18, and John Palmer, an American, were arrested for the murder of William Milk in the latter's stable Monday night. Both have confessed their guilt. They agreed to kill Milk for his money, the one striking the first blow to have fifty dollars in excess of the other. Palmer says Behrman struck the first blow and that both then pounded Milk's head with a hammer and a club. They hauled the body away to the same night.

Accidents on the Jersey City. JERSEY CITY, N. J., Dec. 29.—Three accidents, one of which was fatal, occurred at the Warren street crossing of the Pennsylvania railroad this morning. Two young men attempted to board a train when they were drawn under the wheels. One was killed and the other had a leg badly crushed. A crowd gathered about the spot, and another train coming along, struck a man and severely injured him. He was, however, taken home by friends.

Fatal Fight With Horse Thieves. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 29.—Three horse thieves, who had stolen three horses from a farmer, were pursued by a posse of seven men and overtaken near Forsyth, Mo. A sharp fight ensued in which two of the pursuers were seriously injured, and two of the thieves, James and Andrew Davis, were shot dead, and the third one fatally injured.

Pottsville & Mahanoy Railroad. HARRISBURG, Dec. 29.—An application was filed in the state department to day for a charter for the Pottsville & Mahanoy railroad company, which is to run from Pottsville to New Boston, a distance of twelve miles. The capital is \$150,000. Joseph C. Bright, of Pottsville, is president.

The President's New Year Calendars. WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—General orders have been issued to the officers of the army and navy now in Washington to assemble at the war and navy departments respectively at 11:30 o'clock, January 1 next, in full uniform, for the purpose of paying their respects to the president of the United States.

She Wants Revenge and \$30,000. NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Rose Horton, who was employed as a domestic for Lord and Lady Moorville, and who was charged by them with stealing money and jewelry, but afterwards discharged by the court, has begun suit against her prosecutors for \$20,000 damages for false arrest and imprisonment.

Honors to Gen. Hancock. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 29.—General Hancock and party arrived here yesterday. A large crowd was at the depot to welcome him. On New Year's day a public reception will be held at the military, fire department and civic societies will turn out.

Col. McClure's Fight in More Trouble. NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Nathaniel McKay, whose time ago assaulted Col. McClure, of the Philadelphia Times in this city, was today remanded for examination on the charge of assaulting George T. Steadme, of this city.

The Emma Bond Trial. HILLSBORO, Ill., Dec. 29.—In the Emma Bond trial yesterday the motion of defense for a continuance of the case, owing to the absence of an important witness, was overruled, and the trial was proceeded with.

Thieves and Their Booty Captured. NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Detectives today arrested two thieves and captured \$1,500 worth of cloth, which had been stolen in Stamford, Conn., Wednesday night, and brought here in a sleigh.

Appointed to the Supreme Court. CHARLOTTE, N. C., Dec. 29.—The case of Albert Davis, Tom Lee and Abram Watkins, negroes, sentenced to be hanged at Winston yesterday, for murdering an elderly colored man, has been appealed to the supreme court.

Shot Himself. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 29.—Thomas H. Whalen, a paper stock dealer, committed suicide this morning, by shooting himself. The cause is believed to have been business difficulties. He leaves a wife and six children.

Bonds to be Paid and Cancelled. HARRISBURG, Dec. 29.—The governor issued a proclamation to day ordering the payment and cancellation of redeemed \$3, \$4, 4.5 and 6 per cent. bonds amounting to \$505,000.

Gen. Grant Improving. NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—There is a marked improvement in Gen. Grant's condition to-day. His physicians say he will be out in three or four days.

Postoffice Establishment. WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—Harrisburg has been established as a presidential post-office of the fourth class; salary, \$1,100.
