NEW BOOKS. "Of Making Books There is No End." The social studies of "The Breadwinners" of the American authorship running through the Century for some time has been concluded and is published in a volume of 319 pages from the press of Harper Brothers.

The House Biography. Trolope's delightful autobiography, so frank and interesting, has been quickly succeeded by Lord Lytton's ("Owen Meredith") publication of his father's life and literary remains. The intense personality of Bulwer—not an attractive one—permeates the story from beginning to end, and the revelations will not change nor shock the popular estimate of the English novelist formed from what has hitherto been known of his character.

Shakespeare's Folk Lore. Of the various forms of Shakespearean study which have been engaged in and the result of which is found in whole libraries of Shakespeareana one of the latest, and by no means least valuable, is an examination of his text to discover the social life of the Elizabethan age. Rev. T. F. Thistleton Dyer, A. M., author of "British Popular Customs Past and Present," is the author of "Folk Lore of Shakespeare," a compilation of the copious Shakespearean references to the manners and customs of the times in which the great dramatist lived and of his manifold knowledge of the folk lore of bygone days.

W. I. Rolfe has concluded his series of Shakespeare's works with a critical volume of 186 pages on Titus Andronicus, the verity of which as of Shakespearean authorship he so strongly discredits that he had to overcome much reluctance to include it in his series. Scholars of English literature will none the less be grateful that he undertook the work to which he brings rare critical powers, and his research and learning illuminate the text with which he has had to deal.

Wm. Blackie, the experienced oarsman, is turning his athletic experience to good practical account in a series of books on calisthenics, the last of which, "Sound Bodies for Our Boys and Girls," abounds in practical directions for the physical improvement and bodily development in the youth of both sexes.

Harper Bros. continue to contribute to the beautiful juvenile literature of the country by the publication of such volumes as James Ois' story of "Raising the Pearl." There cannot be too many of this growing class of children's books to take the place of the flashy literature which is spread broadcast over the country.
