THE POULTRY SHOW.

A VERY AUSPICIOUS OPENING DAY. P ne Fowls of Every Variety-treat Display but not dangerously.

of Figeons-Chicks Hatched by Machinery. The fifth annual exhibition of the Lancaster county poultry society opened to-day in the large hall on the third floor of the new postoffice building, and will con-tinue day and evening until Wednesday evening next. Although several entries from a distance have not yet been received the room is well filled with as choice fowls and pigeous as ever were exhibited any-

The room is the largest and best adapted to the purpose of an exhibition that the phone exchange. society has yet occupied. It is 120 feet in length, its greatest width being 36 feet -the rear portion of the room being some ten feet narrower. About 25 feet square of the rear end of the room has been partitioned off as a business room for the officers of the society and exhibitors having business with them.

The coops in which the fowls are exhibited are placed in seven long rows, some of them being 80 feet in length, and one Short row about half that length. On top 134 pounds, the Coffee Cans weigh—can and of these coops, which are raised about two and a half feet from the floor, are placed smaller ones for the pigeons. The total number of coops is over 500 and nearly all of them are filled with the finest kinds

On the south side of the first avenue, on entering the room and turning to the right, geese, ducks and Partridge Cochin fowls and chicks, a very fine display; and several additional coops of Partridge Cochins occupy the short avenue on the southeast corner of the room. On the north side of the first named avenue are placed the coops containing the Leghorns and Spanish breeds.

are Light Brahmas, Buff Cochins, Brown Leghorns, Hamburgs and other breeds, and on the north side Dark Brahmas, Houdans, Polands, Silkies, Frizzles, Pearl Guineas, &c.
On the south side of the next avenue

are the White Cochins, Langshaus, Black Cochins and other breeds, and on the north side Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes, Dominiques, Dorkings, Javas, Rumples,

The northern avenue is reserved exclusively for Games, of which fine breed there are many admirable specimens, of all the best varieties, including pit birds. The Game Bantams and other varieties of these pretty pets occupy a second tier of smaller coops above the Games. The Incubators.

Looking to the left on entering the hall, the visitor sees four canvas enclosures containing incubators, or chicken hatching machines. The largest of these is called the 'Champion,' and was manufactured and is exhibited by Messis, Singer & Men del, of Elizabethtown It is a large oblong square box, very substantially built, and holds from 400 to 420 eggs. The builders claim for it several advantages not pos-kessed by any other incubator. It can be easily taken apart for transportation, as it is fastened together with iron rods and bolts and screws, there being not a nail about it. It is double-walled throughout, the space between the walls being filled with mineral wool, made of furnace slag, and which possesses the quality of asbertes, being impervious to heat or cold, thus insuring a regular temperature inside the machine no matter what may be the temperature of the atmosphere outside. It also has improved ventilators, improved lamp rest and improved boiler. An ordinary battery is used for regulating the opening and closing the valves to heat. The machine was brought from Elizabethtown yesterday. The trays containing the eggs, which had been in the incubator incubator yesterday, and brought from Elizabethtown to Lancaster this morning. wrapped in blankets, and replaced in the insubator, after being carried in the cars for eighteen miles, the thermometer being below zero. The "peeps" are coming out

The "Success" incubator exhibited by Mr. Humphreville at this city, holds 200 eggs. It is on the same general principle as the "Champion" and has won a title to its name by the success which has attended

This morning Mr. Humphreville set up a second incubator that holds 320 eggs. It is provided with a Law battery, which requires renewal only once a year, and even then at a cost of only a few cents. The merits and demerits of the rival meubators will be no doubt fully explained to visitors by the exhibitors.

A fourth incubator is named the "Axford Glass Hen Exhibition Incubator for Hatching Chickens," It looks not unlike a large cheese box set up on a high stool. It has the usual boiler and battery ap pliances, and holds 100 eggs.

The "Perfect Hatcher" from Elmira.
