FOREIGN MISSIONS.

HEIR RETURN IN MATERIAL WEALTH now Obristian Work in Foreign Lands Pays' -The Growth of the Work-Abundant Increase.

From an address delivered before the Young Men's Missionary society of Beth-James M. Beck, esq., we make the follow-ing extracts of general interest:

The benefits which accrue from the

foreign mission work are three-fold in their nature—pecuniary, mental, moral. To each it will repay us as business men, reviewing the subject in a business and not To each it will repay us as business men, reviewing the subject in a business and not in a sentimental or religious aspect, to give a brief consideration.

To commence then with the lowest.

To commence then with the lowest,

dollars and cents-we will find that for

every dollar and for every cent that we have spent in this cause we have received its return not only in drafts payable in eternity, but in specie, some ten fold some an hundred fold, and some a thousand fold. In entering upon amicable relations with many strange races and peoples, who had been therefore ignorant of their pale faced brethren beyond the seas, and intro ducing into these nations habits of business, industry and sobriety the missionaries have created between them and civi!ized nations a trade whose ever increasing value is simply incalculable. Take a few examples. There was no trade with the Sandwich Islands before the es tablishment of Christian missions. These have cost, up to the present time, in the neighborhood of a million and a half of dollars. The trade of these islands with the port of San Francisco alone now exceeds \$5,000,000. The trade of Micronesia with the United States alone, created by the missionaries at a cost of \$16,000 now exceeds in value \$6,000,000. It has been calculated that every missionary

average a trade amounting in value to

But not merely in the direct acquisition of money are the foreign missions a most profitable pecuniary investment, but they render a still greater service to commerce in the preservation of property. "A penny saved is a penny earned." We live in an age of vast commercial enterprise. Al most every civilized people has its colonies in heathen lands, that pour into its lap the untold wealth of their natural productions. In the inevitable conflict that results from the collision of these civilized and uncivilized people, both we'd ded through centuries of hereditary im pressions to antipodal ideas, the missiona ries are at once a judicial and police power, whose value is incalculable. own country affords us an excellent illus tration of my meaning. Contrast the American Indians under the influence of the government and that of the missiona ries. The former has spent hundreds of millions and thousands of lives in what by courtesy is called a "policy," and the only result has been a decrease of the Indians in number, happiness and morality, and an increase, if that were possible, in that national disgrace which has made us a byword among all people. Under the missionaries, however, at a total expense less than that expended in the annual ladian war, the ladians have increased in numbers, in happiness and morality. In 1868 the Indians in the Moravian missions had 7,476 houses; to day they have over 22,000 In 1868 they cultivated 54,207 acres of land; in 1879, 292,000. In 1868 they harves 1 467,000 bushels of grain; in 1877, 4 650,000 bushels. Does this speak well for the missionaries or ill for the government, or

How does England, think you, with her 25,000,000 of people keep in subjection 200,000,000 of people in India? Let one of her leading scholars and thinkers reply. Said he, in a recent speech in Calcutta: "Christ, not the British government, rules

India."..... Let me only instance the island Figi! In 1954 it was populated by 100, 000 cannibals of the most inhuman type. To day it has printing presses, school houses and churches, with a larger pro portion of church goers than religious Bethlehem and a better average of readers than cultured Boston. What wonder that Dr. Darwin, on emerging from the wilder ness while on a tour of exploration and coming upon a mission station, and not-ing the contrast, said: "The lesson of the missionary is indeed that of the enchanter's wand." The age of miracles

past ! It is forever here. Permit me, at the risk of wearying you on this question of the success of the missions, to give you the cold cloquence and indisputable logic of figures.

At the close of the last century there

were only seven foreign missionary societies; to-day there are seventy. Then, the whole number of missionaries did not exceed 200; to day there are 30,000. Then, there were not 80,000 converts under the care of these missions; to-day they number by the smallest estimate 2,000,000, and the annual increase is 70,000. Then, there were but seventy Sunday schools to day there are over 12,000, with more than 400,000 scholars. Then there were but fifty translations of the Holy Scrip tures with approximately 5,000,030 copies in circulation; to day there are 260 translations of the Word of God, and their present circulation has attained the

the Eastern penitentiary, Philadelphia : "Here and there in the United States a penal institution may be found that fairly earns the pride with which it is pointed out by the surrounding community. In the whole country there may be four or five such. The witness to them admires the fitness of their architecture.

"'Yes,' the warden replies; 'this is not a house of pleasure, and so we have not made it pretty. It is not an abode of crime, and so we have not made it ugly. It is not a place where men seek justice, and therefore we have not made it grandiose and majestic. But it is the house of chastisement—chastening punishment— and so it is made solemn, severe and

calm.'
"The visitor praises the grave and silent decency of all the internal appoint-

ments.
"'Yes,' responded the warden; 'the
peace and dignity of the state are here asserting themselves over the person of the prisoner who has violated them; there is no more room here for merriment and confusion than for strife. "The visitor extols the perfection of the sanitary arrangements.

"Yes,' says the warden, 'when the eriminal was free and his life at his own disposal, he took no such care of it as this. He probably lived a sort of daily suicide. If he shortened his days, the state was, presumably, not to blame. But if we by malice or neglect shorten his days here where he is our captive, we bring upon the state both blame and shame.

For his life is in our custedy, just as the clothing is with which he acme here; the state through its courts, has distinctly declined to tamper with it, and holds it subject to be returned to his own keeping at the expiration of his confinement, in as good order as that in which it was received, the inevitable wear and tear of time alone excepted. Can a state maintain, its peace and dignity as it should, that commits breaches of trust in its very

prisons? "The visitor remarks that a wise benevo lence is necessary even toward bad men.
"But," says the other, "it is not

"The visitor shows his surprise at the absence of all the traditional appliances vilest, and meanest consideration-that of for the correction of the refractory.
