The following account of the interview between the pope and the delegate of the London committee for the suppression of the gaming tables at Monte Carlo are issued by the Vatican for publication : "A deputy of the society against gambling having had the honor of being presented to the holy father, and deplored the sad consequences of gambling, the holy father deigned to reply : 'In presence of many calamitous events we cannot but deplore this serious gambling, the result of frequent misdeeds, ruin to families, and the perdition of souls.' " The pope's organ, the *Monte Carlo de Rome*, publishes the following communication : "Some days ago we protested in our columns against this scandal, manifestly tolerated by the governments. It is time, we think, that it should end."
