ON THE SCAFFOLD.

JOHN MCGINNIS HANGED TO-DAY

He Meets Death Calmiy, Showing No symp toms of Insanity-The story of His Crime-Condemned and Reprieved.

PHILADELPHIA, March 4.—John Me-Ginnis was hanged in the county prison at 10.35 this morning. me Dies as a Sane Eau.

The prisoner seemed fully prepared to

die and paid no attention to anybody but his spiritual adviser.

There was no act betokening insanity, a plea which bas been presistently advanced in his behalf. His devout attention to his spiritual welfare and his general calmness indicated one who fully realized

his position. On the scaffold he embraced and kissed the priest and in the middle of a repetition of the sentence; "Jesus, receive my soul," the drop fell and he seemed to die

without pain. The Crime. McGinnis was a coal peddler and lived at Nicetown. He married Elizabeth Reed claudestinely in 1878, but the couple had hardly been united when the brutal nature of McGinnis became evident by his cruel treatment of his wife. He finally drove her mother, Mrs. Mary Reed, and two children, from his house. In 1881 his wife left him and sought refuge with her mother, who then lived at No. 1303 Fitzwater street. On Tuesday, September 25, 1881, the younger of Mrs. McGinnis' childrep died, and the sorrowing mother failed to notify her husband. McGinnis made his appearance in the neighborhood of the rooms occupied by his wife and her mother on the evening of September 30th. William Harrington, who occupied the lower part of the building, refused him ad mission, and, at the suggestion of Mrs. Reed, her daughter went down to see him. McGinnis pulled out a re-Reed. volver, and the woman turned and ran up the alley. He fired one shot which missed her, but a second shot took effect in her left breast. Mrs. Reed on hearing the shots ran out of the house, and seeing her daughter lying apparently dead upon the pavement, and McGinnis standing with the smoking revolver in his hand, turned and ran down the street, McGinnis following and firing, struck her in the neck. She fell to the ground and almost in-stantly expired. When arrested shortly afterward McGinnis acknowledged the erime and said he would "do it again."

Mrs. McGinnic subsequently recovered. Condemned and Reprieved. McGianis was tried for the murder of his mother in-law, before Judge Yerkes, trial lasted three days, and a motion for a new trial was subsequently denied. In January, 1883, Messrs. Joseph De F. Junkin and Hampton L. Carson, counsel for McGinnis, argued the assignment of a writ of error in the supreme court, the commonwealth being repredecision of the lower court was sustained, and counsel's exertions were next directed to the board of pardons. He obtained a respite for three months that his sanity be inquired into, and though four of the commission recommended his confinement as a criminal lunatic, Dr. Morton held him responsible; and accepting Morton's report, the governor declined to extend the time beyond to day, and then the murderer's counsel made vigorous efforts to have the court appoint a commission in lunacy, but the prison inspectors and physicians declined to sign the required affidavit, and all other devices for delay failing Two hours and a half of laughter.
