## WINTER FEEDING OF CATTLE.

A Farmer's Estimate of the Profit to It. Thomas Baker, an intelligent farmer of the lower end of this county, writes to the

Germantown Telegraph as follows: Owing to the great quantity of hay, straw and all kinds of cattle provender, and also to the unusually heavy crop of Indian corn that was raised the present season, the farmers of Lancaster county have more largely than ever purchased both cattle and sheep for winter feeding and at higher prices than usual-higher indeed than they have ever paid, unless it may have been one or two seasons after the close of the war.

On farms where scarcely anything but a small beef was fattened for family use before, steers have been purchased at five cents per pound in order to try their first experiment at fattening cattle for the spring markets. It remains to be seen what may be their success in realizing profit. If they are not economical, care ful feeders, do not take care both of the condition and stomach of the animal, the presumption is he will make nothing. Certainly their hay, straw, fodder and grain will be turned into homemade ma nure-the best for the land that is made, but this will sum up the profit from present appearances.

Supposing a steer weighing 1,000 pounds live weight during the month of November, is bought at five cents, and by the first of April, five months off yet, he has gained 300 pounds, and then will weigh 1,300 pounds, and if beef should command at that time but five cents, as it often does, he would only have the profit on the added weight, or \$15; or if beef should be worth six cents, then his profit would be \$28 for each steer; and if by his superior and management in good judgment he should have thus gained ing, he should have thus games 400 pounds per head, then at six cents he would sell them for \$84 per head, and his gain would be \$34 on each one-allowing nothing for capital invested or labor done. Hence, it is apparent that while stock cattle are so high and approach so nearly to the price they will bring when fat, there can be no profit in winter feeding unless extra judge of stock, and makes good bar gains when he buys and sells.

The question now especially comes up, oan Eastern farmers make as much by raising stock at what they are now com pelled to give as they can by buying Western stock raised to fatter ? A Western twoyear old if thrifty and in good condition for the stables, will weigh from 800 to 1,000 pounds, and in Eastern Penn sylvania will sell for five cents or more; thus they will bring from \$40 to \$50 per head. It thus seems that there is more profit to the Western stock raisers than to the Eastern stock feeder, after all the cost of transportation and the profits of the middleman are taken into consideration.
