Gymnastics Not An Ancient Diversion.

An English writer on gymnastic exercise says that gymnastics in any technical sense remained unknown to modern Europe until about 1774, when, at an educational establishment founded at Dessau, physical exercises were introduced as

part of the system. Soon afterward a certain Galsmuths of Gotha published a work on gymnastics, and promoted the practice of them in many places. But in Germany it was Jahn of Berlin who first started a public gymnasium, in 1811. His establishment, with several others which had been founded in imitation of it, was closed in 1818 by the police, on the ground that they were used as places of political intrigue. A royal decree at last re-established their legality in 1842 and since that time they have flourished more in Germany than elsewhere,
