A TOBACCO "BOOM."

THE '83 CROP IN GREAT DEMAND.

Huyers on the War Path Through Mnd and Rain-Heavy Deliveries at the City Warehouses-Our Local Market. The long deferred but confidently pre-dicted "boom" in '83 Laucaster county tobacco has arrived. A few weeks ago the farmers complained of the dealers, in

Chinese lingo, that it was "all ee look-ee and no buy-ee." The dealers had scoured the county in all directions, made a note of the places where good tobacco was to be had, but most of them refrained from buying, on the ground that the leaf was not up to their standard of excellence. A few of them, however, were quietly buying all the good goods they could get at low figures. The heavy deliveries of last Saturday week opened the eyes of the non Saturday week opened the eyes of the non-buying packers, and last week they all rushed out into the country, visited the farms they had previously noted down, and seldom left until they had made a purchase. As a consequence, there were immense deliveries at many of the city warehouses last Saturday, several of the packers having received from 50,000 to 100,000 pounds each. On Monday also to \$1.25 the receipts were heavy, a very considerable part of them being unloaded at ware houses whose owners claimed that they

were not buying any!
The trade in general and cigar manu facturing in particular, will be pleased to learn that the leaf received at the warehouses is turning out splendidly.
