Novelist Turgotoff's Mother.

A Russian paper publishes a poor picture of the mother of Turgotoff, which is anything but flattering. This lady was proud and vain to the point of folly, ruling her children as despotically as her slaves. She was as proud of her noble descent as of her riches, and after she became a widow her arrogance knew no bounds. She ordered her household like to a royal one; her serfs bore the titles of office in use at court. Then, her postboy was called postmaster general; her steward, chief of the gendarmes, and so forth. No one might speak to her unless addressed. Not even her sons might appear in her presence unannounced. And when the Emperor Nicholas was married, without her consent, she withdrew from him all pecuniary aid, and let him suffer the most cruel privations. When, in 1849, the cholera broke out in her district, she happened to hear that the infection was spread by means of bacteria that pervaded the air and were breathed in with it.
