Yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock, during the parade of the Warm Springs Indians, the latter were offended by the whoops of a party of men standing in front of the American house, on Front street. An old chief, named Tallakeno, ap proached the men, when a fight ensued be-tween the chief and James Sweeney. The latter received a tremendous blow across the face from the Ladian's rifle, but he recovered from it and knocked the chief lown. Other Indians dragged Sweeney away from the fallen chief and threw hin into the street, without attempting to in-jure him. The manager of the troupe, Mr. Harry Lefevre, pushed Sweeney from the chief, when the former approached the second time, an I supposing Sweeney intended assulting, himself grasped a rifle and prepared for defense. What nearly re sulted in a bloody riot was quelled princi-pally through the efforts of 'Squire John P. Frank. Officer Wittick took charge of Sweeney and the parade passed on. It was stopped on Locust St. a second time by Sweeney, who had escaped from the fficer, but no more fighting ensued, as the old chief, the object of Sweeney's wrath, had been taken into the Franklin house for safety.

OBITUARY. Death of Judge Thacher in California.

Hon. Henry C. Thacher, a leading citien of Pueblo, Colorado, well known in Lancaster, died recently in San Francisco, f Bright's disease from which he had suffered for some time. Only three weeks before he had left Pueblo, seemingly in good health, although it was known to his more intimate friends that he had been suffering for some time, but no one thought that the complaint would develop into anything so serious. He was accompanied on his trip by his wife and Mr. and Mrs. James McCord, While at Los Angeles the weather was very damp and disagreeable, and on Sunday, March 9th, the party left Los Angeles on the steamer for San Francisco, On Monday noon he was seized with convulsions, which continued until 8:30 that evening. There was no physician on board the vessel, but the boat touched at Port Harford where there was a United States revenue cutter with a physician on board, who by the permission the captain accompanied Judge Thacher to San Francisco. In 1869 Presi lent U. S. Grant appointed him United States attorney for Colorado, the duties of which office he discharged for little more than a year, when he resigned.
