

ALL FOOLS' DAY.

Annual Settlements—Judgments, mortgages and Releases—Banks and Business Men—Mobs and Movings.

The first of April has for centuries been known as All Fool's Day. Just why it is so is not positively known, but probably because people endeavor to do on that day an amount of business that might be much more wisely and expeditiously done if it were scattered over a dozen days or more.

Another feature of the day is that every body who possibly can do so makes it a point to move—to change their place of residence or business—on that day. We noted on Monday the principal business removals, but to day added to the torn up store goods, an hundred of wagon loads of household and kitchen furniture being carried from one end of the town to the other, by hundreds of families who are making a change of base—some of them seeking more comfortable quarters, some cheaper ones, and some moving because it is so easily done than to pay rent.

The first of April has long been regarded in Lancaster as annual "boating parties" in which thousands of our country cousins come to town to square off old scores, and commence new ones. To day the crowd is not so large as usual. There were only 710 passengers who came in on the several trains, east and west.

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All the national and private banks are doing a good business. The Farmers' and County banks have been greatly crowded all day, as they were on Monday and Saturday, and though no figures can be given, the aggregate business of the three days will be considerably in excess of the business done last first of April.

At the private banking houses about the same state of affairs exists. The bank money is large, healthy and satisfactory. Money is plenty, but not too plenty. One of the most successful bankers states that money will for some time to come command about 1 per cent. more than it did a year ago.

The Fulton National is doing a thriving business, as it did Saturday and Monday. Monday's business was \$200,000 in excess of the corresponding day last year, and the three days business, including to-day, will be in excess of last year's.
