IN EUROPE.

FOREIGN CABLE FLASHES TO-DAY.

The Dynamiters in France and England—Queen Victoria sick in Darmstadt—Other Foreign Notes of Interest.

LONDON, April 19.—It is reported from Darmstadt that Queen Victoria is suffering from lumbago. She is confined to the palace and receives daily visits from the physician.

Advices from the far East bring rumors of fresh massacres of Christians in Laos. John Daly's trial postponed.

LIVERPOOL, England, April 19.—The suspected dynamiter, John Daly, who has been in jail the past week awaiting his trial, which was to begin to-day, was brought to court this morning, but as the official inquiries into the case are still incomplete, he was again remanded to jail to wait till the authorities are fully prepared to begin his trial.

PARIS, April 19.—The Gaulois (newspaper) says that the police are disposed to recommend to the authorities to expel the dynamiters from France if their actions become too suspicious.

A man who was recently engaged in the dynamite traffic in the Avenue l'Opera has suddenly disappeared.

BASEBALL.

Meeting of the Arbitration Committee To-day.

New York, April 19.—The arbitration committee, acting under the national agreement of the professional baseball associations, met to-day at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, for the purpose of affecting permanent organization for the coming year. It is the province of the committee to assimilate the rules of the four associations, namely, the National League, American Association, Northwestern League and Eastern League. The committee is composed of three delegates from each of the four associations elected yearly, and the regulations regarding the reservation of players come under its special jurisdiction.

H. D. Macknight presided at to-day's meeting. After it had been called to order and certain routine business transacted, the committee adjourned until this afternoon when officers will be elected and rules and regulations adopted.

CONGRESSES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 19.—The House at 12:45 went into committee of the whole on bills reported from the committee on labor. This bill considered was that establishing and maintaining a department of labor statistics.

DOMINICAN NEWS.

NEWARK, N. J., April 19.—The monastery of the Dominican nuns, the only one of the kind in the United States, was opened to-day with appropriate ceremony by Bishop Wigger. The chapel and house were blessed by the bishop, who then blessed the bells and made an address on the behalf of the congregation. The nuns after Tuesday next will be strictly cloistered, no one being admitted to the building.

Return of a Defaulter.

PITTSBURGH, April 19.—H. N. Turner, the defaulting ticket agent of the Pan Handle and Cleveland & Pittsburgh railroads, at Mingo Junction, Ohio, has returned from Canada where he fled with some \$10,000 belonging to the Pennsylvania company. He returns of his own free will and intends affecting a compromise with the railroad officials by returning the bonds.

A New Company to be Chartered.

PITTSBURGH, April 19.—An application will shortly be made for a charter incorporating the Pittsburgh & Allegheny drove yard company. It will erect extensive stock yards in Allegheny and compete with the East Liberty stock yard company for trade. Prominent Pittsburgh and Allegheny and Baltimore & Ohio railroad officials are interested in the undertaking.

Change of Base.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 19.—Benjamin Lloyd, manager of the Western Union telegraph company in this city, has resigned to accept a position as superintendent of the Baltimore & Ohio telegraph company. His headquarters will be at Newark, Ohio.

High Water in Maine.

ELLSWORTH, Me., April 19.—A portion of Hartshorn & Ellis's dam gave way last night and 200,000 feet of lumber went through and brought up against the beams and bridges below. The bridges still hold but much anxiety is felt. The river remains about stationary.

What a Farmer Did With His Sister.

DANVILLE, Pa., April 19.—Henry Suter, a farmer living near here, upon returning home from market this morning, set fire to his house and shot himself in the mouth with a shot gun. He was killed instantly.

New Petroleum Exchange.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 19.—The new Petroleum Exchange here will be opened on Monday next with imposing ceremonies. The building, which has just been finished, is the most complete structure of its size in the city.
