A TRIP AMONG THE PAR OFF STARS

A String of Brilliants in the Heavens Coursing With Celestral Boules-The Procession of Worlds, arrett P. Serviss, in N. Y. Sun.

The April evening skies are particularly a tractive this year on account of the simultaneous presence of the planets Merenry, Venus, Saturn, Jupiter, and Mars-a string of brilliants hanging adown the western heavens. At one glance the observer can now see nearly the whole planetary family of the sun, the earth's brother and sister worlds in shining array. It requires no astronomical instruments to perceive that these planets shift their places from week to week; that some are slow paced and some swift footed; that some shine with a dazzling whiteness and others with a leaden or ruddy hue, and that they all differ in appearance from the

fixed stars. This brilliant procession of worlds is a spectacle of intense interest to every one who stops to consider how closely in orgin and destiny, as well as in physical resemblances, they are linked with the globe upon whose surface we pass our

lives.
But the observer must in imagination place himself outside the solar system in order to get a comprehensive view of its relations to the universe around it. If a man could ride upon a comet as it approached the system from outer space, he would obtain a true conception of our situation in the universe.

Suppose our rider meets his comet; hundred thousand million miles from the sun. Even then he has not traversed one two hundredth part of the interval separating the sun from the nearest fixed star, but he has left all the planets far behind him. From that magnificent height and distance what a prospect expands around him ! Here he is, out in open space, which spreads away beyond the reach of imagination in every direction. There is no sunlight here, for at this distance the sun dwindled to a star, and twinkles among its fellows. There is no air here, and the vast dome of the universe is like jet, with countless millions of stars glit tering on every side like diamonds in black depths. Yet it is not even starlight, for there is no medium to diffase

their radiations. And that little point of piercing light yonder; that insignificant star, is the sun which was went to shed such an incom prehousible blaze of light; to turn night into day; whose rising was like a new creation of light and life upon the earth? Ay, there is no doubt of it Thus at once into space the star quenching sun is diminished to a spark. And where are the planets, where the earth? Hidden in the rays of that star. The height from which Lucifer descended when

If we suppose him to be a little star has now grown to a gigantic endowed with a most piering vision-and may see, in different directions, other comets journeying sunwards, and perhaps meteors in swarms and singly, joining the general procession toward the solar centre, out on every side, hundreds of thousands, Already the loneliness of space is gone, and his comet and the sun are no longer the only material bodies within distance measurable to human comprehension.

The sun continues to increase in size and splendor as it approaches it, and if he had any means of measuring his velocity the passenger would perceive that the speed of the comet is becoming frightful. Now he sees that it is a metropolis of the universe he is approaching. All roads to it; the number of his fellow travelers, coming from every direction, increases. They draw closer together as they near the focus of their motion.

And presently the solar system, this great city of space in which we dwell, beoners to the sun-turning them by its attraction into closed orbits as they entered the outskirts of the solar system. He sees this far away sentinel planet revolving at a distance from the san equal to nearly twice that of Neptune. Yet from his point of view it seems to be just out-side the rays of the sun. But, forthwith, as he continues to approach, he catches with its rings slowly emerges to view; next gigantic Jupiter rolls into sight; then that swarm of tiny worlds, the asteroids; and then ruddy Mars; after which our earth, with its attendant moon, turns its and Mercury and the teeming millions of meteors that crowd the neighborhood of the sun appear in turn, and finally the voyager from outer space beholds the

As the microscopist, by means of his powerful lenses, which, in effect, enable him to bring the object he is studying exceedingly close to his eye, sees a duil speck enlarge into a wonder world of minute creation, so our man upon a comet, merely by approaching close to the solar system, has seen a twinkling star enlarge into a blazing sun, and out of its rays emerge a crowd of worlds, basking in its heat and light, and presenting a spectacle that might make an angel exclaim with astonishment and delight. From the cold and darkness and lonesomeness of space the wandering comet has borne him into the glare and bustle of a solar system. He cannot doubt that if his celestial courser had carried him into the neighborhood of some other star he would have beheld a scene equally or perhaps even more won dertul

And now the comet enters the solar system and rushes headlong in among the planets toward its centre attraction, the sun. A great change gradually takes place in its appearance. Perhaps the comet's rider could tell just how and why have never yet been able satisfactorily to explain it. At any rate it begins to assume a flery aspect. mat's motion not to be greatly inclined to the general plane of the system, he is able to study the aspect of these various worlds. Terrestrial astronomers can never have such views as he gets of those outposts of the solar system, Uranus and Neptune. He obtains, perhaps, an insight to the nature and constitution of the splendid rings that encircle Saturn, to possess which a Galilio or a Herschel would almost have bartered life itself. He perceives in Jupiter, far more clearly than we are able to do with our greatest telescopes, the marvellous phenomena of a giant planet which is just being born out of the chaotic elements of an extinguished sun. He has a close view of some of the throng of minute planets that circulate between Jupiter and Mars-planets which are so small, some of them, that their equators might serve as a race track for Weston and Rowell and the other go-as-

ou-please pedestrians. What wonderful sights may he not beold upon Mars, a world that has advanced in its planetary development many ages beyond the earth, and to whose in habitants some astronomers have not hes itated to ascribe achievements that would be as impossible to the descendants of Adam as the bridging of the Atlantic

ocean. He can obtain a most striking view of this living earth and its dead comrade, the moon-the one whirling swiftly upon its axis and enjoying the rapid succession of day and night; its waters sparkling in the sunshine; its green prairies and forests glowing with beauty; cities dotting its surface; a cloud peopled atmosphere sur-rounding it, vegetation covering the slopes of its mountains; and its oceans, as well as its continents, filled with a profusion of life from its luxuriant equator to its snow capped poles; the other hanging almost otionless upon its axis, a worn out world, without air, without water, without vegetation, without life, only a desert expanse of barren rocks ; its naked mountains ; its silent volcanoes; its untenanted plains, and its old empty sea bottoms presenting a scene of utter desolation, turned to the untempered glare of the sun without the shadow of a cloud or a tree to hide it.
