AN EXTENSIVE FIRE IN LONDON. The Egyptian Question to be Considered by the Powers—Insolations of Revolution in the South of Spain.

RAILROAD COMPANIES SUE. PITTSBURG, Pa., April 26.—Two suits have been brought in the United States circuit court in this city by Martha Pier and B. F. Livingston against the New York, Lackawanna & Western railway, for damages in the sums of \$25,000 and \$20,000 respectively.

SENTENCED TO BE HANGED. SANDWICH, Ont., April 26.—Luko Pinsky, charged with shooting his wife on a ferry boat on the 14th of August, was found guilty of wilful murder to day, and sentenced to be hanged on the 17th of June.
