Abu Buzard was recently seen near Berthouff, armed with a Winchester breech loading rifle, an eighteen shooter.

The board of directors of the New Holland National bank on Tuesday declared a semi annual dividend of 2 1/2 per cent. In addition to this \$2,000 were placed to the surplus fund and over \$2,000 were retained in the profit and loss account.

The surplus fund of the bank is now \$10,000. Emanuel Helman, formerly of Mt. Joy, died in Lebanon while there on a visit to his sister. He was buried from the Mt. Joy Evangelical church on Thursday.
