COLUMBIA RIVER SALMON. A Tremendous Yield Supported by Four

N. Y. Herald. "The completion of the Northern Pacific railroad has opened a new industry and made it possible to land salmon from the Columbia river, Oregon, in New York, in exactly seven days after they are taken from the water," said Mr. E. G. Blackford. " Heretofore it took twenty-one days to bring Oregon salmon to our mar-kets. Although it is not generally known it may be said that the Columbia river is the most prolific fish stream in the world, its annual yield being ten times greater than that of any other river.

"Heretofore the Columbia river salmon bave been either salted or canned, and so abundant was the yield last year that the world was glutted with canned salmon. The market was greatly overstocked, and instances were known where dozens of one pound cans were sold as low as one

"As soon as the salmon began to run in the Columbia river this spring shipments were commenced from Portland, Oregon, by the Pacific express and were landed in this city in good order and sold at retail fortwenty five cents per pound." The Four Varieties.

There are four different varieties of salmon found in the Columbia river. The first makes its appearance in March, and is known as the "steel head" (Salmo gardnersi). These fish are noted for the fact that their skull bone is so hard that the salmon steel heads. that it cannot be cut with a hatchet. In weight they average from twelve to twenty pounds each, and their fiesh, which is a pale pink, has an insipid flavor and is not esteemed good eating by the Oregonians.
The next variety is the "Chinook" (Oncorhyncus quinna). In shape and size it
differs from the "steel head," being a much broader fish, chunky and of larger siza; its weight runs from fifteen to fifty pound each; in color its flesh is a very deep red. Its flavor is equal to the Ken-nebeck salmon, and this is the fish that is used by the canner.

The third variety is the "blue black salmon, which has not as yet been classi-fied by scientists. It is very much smaller than the two just named, weighing only from three to five pounds each. The "blue black" is a symmetrical fish. Its flesh is deep red in color and equal in flavor to the "Chinook." Both the Chinook and the blue black differ from the steel head, as their skulls can be easily split open with a knife. The fourth and last variety is a salmon that weighs from fifteen to twenty pounds and resembles in every particular the California or rainbow Like the "raindow" it has a red dish band running from its head to its tail. Its flesh is pale pink in color and in flavor inferior to the Chinook.

Commercial Interests. "Early in the opening of the Northern Pacific railread," continued Mr. Blackford a refrigerating car company was estab lished by the Marquis de Mores, a Frenchman. The first car load of 20,000 pounds of salmon was shipped on Friday night last from Dallas, Oregon, It will arrive in this city on Saturday night. The fish are caught on the Columbia river by what are known as salmon wheels. These wheels are erected on the banks of the river, and are turned by machinery worked by steam. The fish are so abundant that they are scooped up by the wheel and thrown on the ground. The salmou are then eviscerated and packed in boxes, 100 pounds o fish in each box. The boxes are stowed in the refrigerator car where a temperature of thirty five, degrees is maintained. The cars are attached to passenger train and arrive here in seven days.
