BENHURR FUTURE COLLECTION. Duke of Marlborough Offers Eleven of Them to the National Gallery - Other European Notes.

LONDON, May 23.—The Duke of Marlborough has made an offer to the director of the national gallery, of eleven of the best pictures in the collection of Blandford Palace for £367,500. The duke has applied to the court of chancery for permission to sell his pictures, and this offer is made subject to his gaining that.

AT WASHINGTON. Kellogg Asks for a House of Investigation. WASHINGTON, D. C., May 23.—In the House Kellogg offered a resolution requesting that his character had been reflected upon during the investigation of the Star Route frauds, and asking for a committee to sit him in connection with the charges.

NEW YORK, May 23.—It is said that U. S. District Attorney Elliot Root has expressed his determination to ask the United States grand jury, which will sit in June next, to indict Ferdinand Ward, James D. Fisk and John C. Eno, the first as a director and the others as presidents of the national banks, for fraud and embezzlement.
