TO-DAY'S NEWS FROM ALL AROUND. The Penn Bank Failure at Pittsburg—Great Shortage of Securities Reported and Collateralizing Meeting.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 29.—Henry Warner, assignee of the Penn bank, has taken charge and discharged the clerks. He will begin work at once, but says it will require two weeks and possibly thirty days before a statement of the exact condition of affairs can be made.

The deficiencies, it is believed, will reach fully a million and a quarter dollars. It is said that \$700,000, which were known to be on the counter when the bank closed, only \$4,000 was turned over to the assignee.

Great Shortage of Securities Reported. Also reported since Saturday, and bonds, stocks and other collateral in the bank at the time of suspension are said to be missing.

WIRELESS. Afternoon Telegraph News Condensed. A fire to day on Courtland and Greenwich streets, New York, damaged building and goods to the extent of \$50,000.

At Harrisburg, the pardon board at a meeting last night, decided not to interfere in the case of Jesse Carter, sentenced to be hanged at Pittsburg. Carter will therefore be hanged June 3.

Ward's shoe factory, in Brooklyn, burned to day. Loss \$200,000. Around Ottawa, Ont., the frost has badly damaged the fruit and other crops.

John N. Parke, a contractor, convicted recently of conspiracy and forgery in connection with Major Phipps' almoner's frauds, was sentenced at Philadelphia to day to one year's imprisonment at hard labor on the first charge and six months solitary confinement on the second charge.

At Philadelphia, Christian K. Ross said to-day that he had received the photograph of the boy found at Quincy, supposed to be the long missing Charlie Ross, but was unable to identify it as that of his son.

The minute description accompanying the photograph also disagrees with the description of Chaslin.

Mr. Hadway's Will Admitted to Probate. New York, May 29.—Surrogate Rollins to day gave a decision admitting to probate the will of the late Richard G. Hadway, of a recent meeting, family, who died in February last, leaving an estate valued at about \$350,000.

By the will the decedent made certain bequests which were disputed by the next of kin, two grand children, on the ground that the will was invalidly executed, not duly executed and that it was procured by undue influence.

Sad Outlook for Laborers. CINCINNATI, Ohio, May 29.—The owners of the rolling mills in Cincinnati, Newport and Covington have come to an agreement to demand that their employees sign a bill of wages 10 per cent. lower than the present wages, to go into effect on June 1st.

In case the workers refuse to accede to the reduction the owners will shut down the mills indefinitely. The proposition has not yet been presented to the workmen.
