THE NOMINEE. ENTHUSIASM OVER MR. BLAINE. The committee to formally apprise him of his nomination—What the London Times' Thinks of the Result. CHICAGO, June 7.—The committee to notify Blaine and Logan of their nomination have been appointed. It consists of one member from each state and Gen. John B. Henderson chairman. New York is represented by Andrew D. White, New Jersey by William Walter Phelps, Pennsylvania by Galusha A. Grow, Delaware by Washington Hastings and Maryland by J. McPherson.

At San Francisco the Republican ratification meeting last night was a magnificent demonstration in favor of Blaine. The nomination has been enthusiastically received all over the Pacific coast. Reports from all over Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky, report much enthusiasm among the Republicans over Blaine's nomination. The fire, fireworks, cannon and ratification meetings are the forms of expression used. What the London "Times," which knows all about it, thinks. LONDON, June 7.—The Times says: "The Republican party in the United States has done itself honor in nominating so well known and distinguished a man as Blaine. If the Democrats could make up their mind on a definite and reasonable free trade policy they would certainly secure more sympathy on this side of the Atlantic than has hitherto been accorded them. Meantime, we must congratulate the Republic on the choice of a candidate so eminently suited as Blaine to represent and uphold the dignity of the United States."

Mr. Blaine's Political Prediction. LONDON, June 7.—Under the heading, "A Beaconlight Beyond the Sea," the Pall Mall Gazette says: "Blaine's nomination is the most notable event for England since President Lincoln was assassinated. Wherever Blaine comes he is hailed from the position they hold on the American continent he will endeavor to replicate English influences and trade by American. His menacing intimation that he would disregard the Clayton Bulwer treaty is an eye opener for future relations of England and America. His intervention in Peru was most ominous when he declared that he disliked England to win commercial triumphs in fields which legitimately belong to America. England will watch with extreme solicitude the progress of the electoral campaign."

MURDER IN NEW YORK STATE. A Husband Shoots the Alleged Ransomer of His Wife. UTICA, N. Y., June 7.—David Weaver, aged about 60 years and in comfortable circumstances, married and having four children, was found dead yesterday near Charles Magyala's barn at Steuben Corners, in the northern part of Oneida county. Late last night it was developed that Weaver had been intimate with the wife of Richard Jones, a neighbor, extremely intimate. Weaver left his home on Thursday about 10 p. m. It is supposed he went to Jones' house and that the latter returning to a Welch celebration at Rome, discovered and shot him as he departed. The bullet passed from his neck to his brain. Jones' house, Mrs. Jones is about 35, and has three or four children.

UNDERSUED TELEGRAMS. A sharp earthquake shock of six seconds duration was felt at Alleghy, Egypt, yesterday. No serious damage. In Galveston, Texas, San Diego, Texas, dispatch says Refugio Garmas was executed here today (Friday) for the murder of Estiluis Dimas, about a year ago. Dr. Samuel Allen, the Vermont physician who shot and killed Dr. Hansell in a Howard street saloon in Boston, was today indicted for murder by the grand jury.

IN CONGRESS. Bills to Repeal the Civil Service Act Reported Adversely. WASHINGTON, D. C. June 7.—The House, Mr. Hoblitzel (Md.) from the committee on reform of the civil service reported adversely on the bill to repeal the civil service act and they were laid on the table. The House then proceeded to the consideration of the bill for the forfeiture of the unearned Atlantic and Pacific grant.

Fire in Galveston. GALVESTON, Texas, June 7.—Yesterday morning fire destroyed the Prince building a large two story brick corner of Strand and Center avenues. The ground floor was occupied by E. J. Bering & Co., wholesale grocers; Lynch & Penland, auction commission merchants, and Adone & Habit, private bankers and cotton factors. The second story was occupied by cotton firms and the French consular office. Loss \$100,000.

The Amalgamated Association Reunion. BEAVER, Pa., June 7.—The fifth annual reunion of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, held in Beaver, Pa., is attended by twenty thousand people. Delegations are present from Wheeling, Youngstown, Niles, Pittsburg and other iron centres. The reunion is a great success and the best order prevails.

Cotton Mill to Shut Down. SPRINGFIELD, Mass., June 7.—One of the seven cotton mills of the Dwight corporation at Chicopee will be shut down for 4 to 8 weeks because of the continued drop in the price of cotton as compared with the receipts from the finished cloth. No employees will be thrown out of work.
