JAMES H. BRYSON.

Interesting Sketch of an Old Laucastroan Forney's Progress of June 14, contains an interesting sketch of James II. Bryson, an old Lancastrian who was closely identified with the early history of journalism in this city. The sketch refers graphically to that period in 1836; when Mr. Bryson and the late John W Forney became the editor of the INTEL LIGENCER, when Lancaster had but a population of 10,000:

The INTELLIGENCER, under their management, put new life and vigor into journalism in the city of Lancaster. In 38 Mr. Bryson sold his interest to Mr. Forney, and took a position with Gales & Seaton, government printers, at Washington. In '40, in Lancaster, ington. In '40, in Lancaster, under the firm of Bryson, Pearsol & Wimer, was established the Weekly Age, Semi-Weekly Gazette, and Daily Gazette, the first daily ever published in Lancaster. They were independent, advocating temperance and all the enterprises of that community, especially the formation of a company for the erection of the Conestoga cotton mills, as also James Coleman's work in making the Conestogs navigable to Safe Harbor. The papers circulated widely, and were noted literary taste and neat typography, far in advance of the wants of the city in which they were published."

Mr. Bryson retired from business in 1882. Since then he has been resting with his family, after fifty years of enterprise in printing and literary work.

HIESTER CLYMER.

HIS SCOPEN DEATH IN READING Stricken With Apoplexy While Conversing With Friends Yesterday, He Dies This Morning-Sketch of His Career.

READING, Pa , June 13 .- Hon. Hiester

Clymer died here suddenly, of paralysis, this morning, aged 57 years. He was stricken by an apopleotic stroke at his residence, Perkiomen avenue and Franklin streets, last evening, while conversing with friends. The prostration occurred at half past five o'clock. He lay unconscious all night and died this morning at seven o'clock without speak-

ing a word.

[Hon. Hiester Clymer has long been a prominent figure in the politics of Berks county. He was elected a state senator from 1861 to 1866 succeeding Benjamin Nunnemacher. The Democratic Convention of 1866 placed him in the field as that party's candidate for governor in the latter year, but John W. Geary, his Republican opponent, carried off the prize. The Democratic county convention of August 12, 1872, nominated him for Congress as the successor to the Hon. J. Lawrence Getz, and he served four terms, retiring in 1881. The crowning work of his po litical life was the Belknap exposure of 1874. Mr. Clymer is of an old and distinguished family, his ancestors being prominent in the days of the revolution and early years of this country. He was in the 66th year of his age.—EDS. The Consular and Diplomatic Appropriation Bill Passes the Senate.

Washington, June 12 .- On motion of Mr. Allison the Senate took a final vote on the consular and diplomatic appropria-tion bill, and it was passed by a vote of yeas, 38; nays, 2, Vance and Van Wyck. The bill as passed is almost precisely as reported from the Scuate committee on appropriations, making an addition of \$800,000 to the bill as reported from the House.

At 11 o'clock the committee arose and the legislative day of Thursday opened at 11:15 a. m. The House again went into committee of the whole on the river and harbor bill.

An amendment offered by O'Neill, of Pa., for a survey of the proposed ship canal from the Delaware to the Atlantic ocean was lost. When the committee arose and reported the bill to the House, Oates, of Ala, moved to strike out the Hennepin canal clause. After debate the motion to strike out was agreed to ; yeas the table.

The wreckers wedged one end of a sleeper under one rail and blocked the other end of it on top of the opposite rail with stone. A farmer discovered the obstruction and emoved it just as the passenger train bound for New York came in sight.

WILMINGTON, Del., June 12 .- A Cambridge, Md., special reports that the second trial of "Bug" Cephas, colored, for the murder of Mrs. Celia Murphy, resulted this morning in a verdict of murder in the first degree. He was convicted on his first trial, but the court granted a new trial, because the verdict failed to specify any degree of murder.

A LADY SWINDLES AMBRETAIL

The Jury Comforts Miss Morse's Victions by Pronouncing her Gality.

Carrie R. Morse, late president of the Ladies investment bureau, was tried again Wednesday in the New York general sessions, the jury having disagreed in her first trial. Miss Morse was attired with evident care. A veil covered her black plumed hat, and was drawn coquettishly half over her face. A Jacqueminot rose-bud was in the bosom of her tight fitting black silk dress. Within the bar were a score of women, young and old, who have suffered from Miss Morse's devices. Among them was a widow, who sold her shoe store to obtain money to put into Miss Morse's hands for investment and was compelled to send her four children to a charitable institution until she could obtain employment to support them.

tain employment to support them.

Miss Morse was tried upon the charge of obtaining \$600 from Helen Wilson, in November, 1882, by means of fraudulent representations. Miss Hattie Herder was engaged as an assistant at \$12 a week, and Miss Wilson advanced \$600 as security for the faithful performance of her duties. Miss Morse said that she required security from all her employes. Miss Harder's duties and pay in the investment bureau proved to be mythical, but Miss Wilson did not recover the security.

Ex-Assistant District Attorney O'Byrne moved for Miss Morse's discharge upon the ground that the receipt for the \$600 showed that it was to be returned, with six per cent. Interest, and therefore, the transaction was a loan. This York promised to do, and in the meantime visited a prominent lawyer in Clyde. Returning to North Rose, he secured several thousand dollars and left for Dakota. Immediately after York's departure. Durkson after York's departure Dunham discovered that his wife had deserted him. Wednesday he drove to Clyde and boarded 146, nays 123.
