## TRESPASS VI ET ARMIS.

A Peculiar Case Heard before Alder-This morning a law suit of a very pecu-liar character was heard before Alderman Barr. It was a case of trespassivi et armis, brought by Emanuel Killinger against Forrest Hogg. The facts elicted by the evidence were as follows: Killinger was the lessee of a horse belonging to A. P. Lovett. The horse was placed in charge of Killinger's sons, by Killinger's own orders. While they were driving it one day, the horse took fright and ran off. Mr. Hogg in attempting to stop the horse, struck it over the head with a heavy club, crushing its skull and killing it. Mr. Lovett, of course, held Killinger responsible for the loss of the horse, and Killinger holds Hogg re-sponsible, suing him for taking the prop-erty from him by force of arms, and laying the damages at \$140, the value of the horse. On hearing the testimony Alder-man Barr rendered judgment for the full amount of the claim, and the case will no doubt be appealed to court.
