The Three Factious Agree Upon Their Respective Representations - The Proceedings in Detail - Other Conventions. SARATOGA, N. Y., June 18.—At the New York Democratic convention to-day, the delegates began filing in the hall at 12:30 o'clock.

After passing several resolutions bearing upon the representation of the various factions, the convention at 2:30 p. m., adjourned until 7 o'clock. As the members dispersed some one called for a cheer for Flowers. The most enthusiastic response, but the chairman promptly restored order.

The caucus of the county Democracy and state Democracy this morning adopted a resolution looking to harmony among the factions to be elected, a full Democratic vote may be cast for a Democratic president of the United States.

At the Democratic state convention last night resolutions were adopted affirming the principles of the party as enunciated in numerous national conventions, favoring a tariff for revenue, and a tariff for protection.
