THE STATE EDITORS.

THE ASSOCIATION AT GETTYSBURG.

A Dinner in the Woods—A Look at the Indian School—The New Railroad—Viewing the Battlefield.

The state editorial association, to the number of two hundred gentlemen and ladies, which proceeded from Harrisburg to Gettysburg on Tuesday, by the new line of railroad connecting the capital of the state with its great battlefield, stopped en route to look at the interesting Indian training school at Carlisle, thence by rail the trip was made to Pine Grove park, where a picnic dinner was served in the woods, and then the route lay by Col. Fuller's new railroad, over the mountain to the objective point of the excursion. The road, though new, rides smoothly, and the route is picturesque and beautiful all the way, gaining in interest as it descends the slope, and with a full view of the great plain over which the armies fought on those fateful days of 1863. During their stay in Gettysburg and the beautiful surroundings of the Eagle and Springs hotels, the party as a whole and in many smaller companies, visited the hundred points of interest in which the locality abounds, and in this practical study of the most famous historical spot with the borders of their state, found ample satisfaction in their visit. It was a subject for universal congratulation that the greatly improved railroad facilities, by the completion of the Harrisburg and Gettysburg line, have brought the place within easy access to the great cities and connected it with main lines of travel; and that by the action of those interested, in designating the localities of the field, every spot of personal and historical interest will soon come to be marked with imperishable monuments and granite. The magnificent views of the admirable preservation of the main points of the field; the well kept cemetery; the thoroughly informed guide, Mr. Holtzworth; and all the conveniences of visiting this greatest of modern battle fields combined to make the visit to Gettysburg as profitable and interesting, as it is easy and of slight expense.

The Presentation to Mr. Menamin.

The most notable feature and indeed the only formal exercise of the association reunion was the public meeting in the court house on Wednesday evening, when a large and fashionable audience was in attendance. The Pennsylvania college club followed the exercises with college songs, and President Menamin of the association was in the chair. W. U. Hensel, master of the house, presided, and the importance and significance of the Gettysburg battle and then passing to a consideration of the acts of peace and the place among them of the editorial profession and the printer's craft. Eugene H. Menamin, the accomplished editor of the Press-Spectator, read his poem, which will be found printed in this issue of the INTELLIGENCER and which was received with applause. Then followed the presentation to Mr. Menamin, from the association, of a testimonial for his efficient services during fifteen years in the office of secretary, treasurer and manager of its exercises. Hon. Thos. Chaffant, of Danville, referred fittingly to these and made the presentation. The testimonial consisted of an elegant gold watch, chain and pendant, which right appropriately represented the skill of Pennsylvania workmen; the watch was obtained from the Lancaster watch company, and the chain and pendant from John S. Kelly, of Philadelphia. The watch is of very superior movement, and the case a masterpiece of elegant design and artistic finish. On one side is an elaborate monogram "H. S. M." and on the other an adequate and highly finished engraving of Gettysburg, taking his first proof from the first form of cast metal type. It is a wonderfully fine example of the graphic art. Inside the case is the inscription:

"Presented to Robert S. Menamin by the Editorial Association of the State of Pennsylvania, as a mark of regard and as a mark of its appreciation of his services as secretary during fifteen years. Gettysburg, June 18th, 1884"

The chain is massive and formed of a solid piece of metal, and the pendant is a masterpiece of delicate workmanship. On a solid framed ground is chased in high relief the coat of arms granted by the Emperor Frederick III. to German printers shortly after the introduction of the art of printing. On the reverse side is an equally appropriate representation of the familiar head of our own Franklin, as it appears in the title of "The Printer's Circular," published by the recipient of this peculiarly appropriate and elegant gift.

In responding to the sentiments of Mr. Chaffant and in receiving the testimonial of his friends and associates Mr. M. gave an interesting account of the association and its reunion; and the meeting adjourned after marking one of the most pleasant episodes in the history of the association.

The party scattered on Thursday evening, after a hop at the Springs hotel, and after a unanimous vote that the trip to Gettysburg was an entire success.

Thinking Out the Trees

Somehow the trees seem to be thinning out the more the years go by. The trees that are overbearing should be attended to. Especially should this process be followed when clusters exist, as there are certain varieties that grow in clusters and where such is the case to frequently cut them down before they become knotty, badly shaped or wormy, and all of them less in size than those growing singly. It is true that upon large trees this cannot be done, but can readily upon trees up to from twelve to perhaps fifteen years old, and upon all dwarfs. Many persons not well posted in fruit growing hesitate to thin out their trees, on the ground that their crop will be seriously diminished thereby, and the income proportionally reduced.
