#### NIAGARA FALLS.

PLANS TO UTILIZE ITS WATER POWER A Plant of \$5,000,000,000 Required to Pat Into Effective Use Its 7,000,000 Horse-Power.

Chicago Journal of Commerce. Mr. Benjamin Rhodes, at a recent meet ing of the American association of civil engineers, discusses as follows the greater utilization of Niagara:

Dynamic electricity is used substantially for the electric light, but this has become a great industry. It is the object of this paper to show what has been done and what may be done toward the utilization of Niagara for electrical purposes. The power of Niagara can be best estimated very approximately. The average flow of the river according to the many careful measurements is 275,000 cubic feet per second. The fall in the river through the rapids immediately above the fall is sixtyfive feet. The height of the falls is 165 feet, making a total of 230 feet; thus we have for the whole power 7,000,000 horsepower. To utilize this amount of power by water-wheels, generate electrical currents and transmit to various cities within 500 miles would necessitate a plant representing at least \$5,000,000,000.

A small proportion of the power of Niagara is already utilized, and a much larger amount can be developed at moderuse is represented by a small overshot wheel under six feet head, which has for many years propelled a solid piston single acting pump, furnishing a meager supply of water to the adjoining village. On the American side, slong the rapids on Goat Island and the mainland, there are five separate raceways using from four to sixteen feet head, and developing in all 800 to 1,000 horse power, most of which is now in actual use. If the project for the ap-propriation of lands for a state reservation at Niagara is carried out, all these races will come within the fixed bounds of the park, and will, of course, be odious in the

eyes of the commissioners and be swept The greatest power now in use at N agara, however, lies outside the proposed state park. It is the Hydraulic canal, and was constructed about 1855. It is out through solid rock across the peninsular, on which the village of Niagara Falls is built, taking the water from the extreme head of the rapids and discharging below the falls, giving opportunity to use the entire head of 230 feet. The canal is nearly one mile long, and was planned 100 feet wide and ten feet deep. It has been excavated but seventy feet, and half the distance is but thirty five feet wide. It is at present partially filled with debris, being at certain points no more than five feet in depth. At the lower end is a basin neary at right angles with the canal, which F. Schoellkopf, possessed of large capital was only one water wheel on the canal. using an aggregate of hearly, or tail-water over the side of the precipice, the various streams falling over 100 feet to the river below. Some of these wheels are of large size when the head is con-sidered, several being capable of giving 1,100 to 1,500 horse power. The last two years have seen great improvements in the

making and setting of wheels, and the working of all the mills is now regular and continuous Further developments of power at Niag ara may be made at little expense. The Hydraulic canal can be deepened and widened, and wheels may be set under greater heads, the total amount thus available here being equal to the neces sities of many years. Large powers may also be developed at Goat Island and Prospect Park in case the State Park plan is not effected; in either place 10,000, 25,000 or, even 50,000 horse power being easily available. It may safely be said that the use of Nisgara has just begun. On the Canada side the entire | the results arrived at are remarkable, but, with regard to others, it must be said that they are to a considerable degree con jectural, and scarcely warrant any general deductions. Divorce is granted in Denmark when either husband or wife can establish a charge of habitual drunkenness against the other, and it appears that the number of cases in which marriage is dissolved on that account has increased in ten years by about one-fourth. In 1871 the total number of divorces was 325, of which 70 were on account of drunkenness; in 1880 the total was 388, and the number

referred to drunkenness 104. The population had in the ten years increased per cent; it appears, therefore, that nearly the whole increase in the aggregate of matrimonial separations is to be attributed to excessive drinking. The total number of marriages in Denmark is about 14,600 a year and of these one in 150 is dissolved through drunkenness on the one side or be the other. In the vast majority of the cases it is on the side of the husband. In the years 1876 80 the husband was in fault in 476 cases, and the wife in only 28. regard to the effect of the drinking habits of the Danish people on pauperism it cannot be said that the figures presented are such as we should expect. The prependerance of male drupkards ar rested over female is very marked. The numbers in the period under notice were 61,642 and 2,537 respectively. The amount of disease and death which should be referred to drunkenness can only be stated vaguely for want of the neccessary data. In Copenhagen there has been a remarkable decrease in the deaths from delirium tremens and chronic alcoholism, along with a great multiplication of public houses and angmented consumption of spirits. On the other hand, there is a very considerable growth growth of lunacy, and the in-

crease in suicide is described as "very marked." In Copenhagen 63 persons committed self destruction in 1879, 71 in 1881, and 78 in 1882.
