AN EX-CONVICT'S TERRIBLE CRIME, Atter Outraging a Twelve-Year-Old Girl, tie Kills Her, Is Shot by a Mob and Escapes.

GALVESTON, Texas, July 18.—A dispatch from Richmond says: On Wednesday, as Hannah Burton, aged 12, was returning from school, she was met by Webb Hetton, an ex-convict, who attacked and outraged her and then killed her, burying raged her and then killed her, burying her body shortly afterwards. The girl's clothes were found bloody, muddy and torn. Hetten, who had been seen near the place, was arrested and confessed the crime and pointed out where the body was hidden. Officers then tied his hands, put a rope@around his neck and started for Richmond with him. They were much him informated growd, who took were met by an infuriated crowd, who took the prisoner, tied him to a tree and shot him fifteen times. They then took the rope off him and left him for dead. After the lynchers departed, Hetten recovered, went home, dressed his wounds and fled. Officers are now hunting for him.

Its Ravages in Toulon and Marseilles Knowing No Abatement.

Toulon, July 18.—Fourteen deaths occurred here from cholera last night. The

Madame Adam's Entry Into Literature. Madame Adam will visit America to study its institutions and learn what there is to be learned here, and will probably write a book other impressions. 'Why, I have done that very thing, I responded with alacrity; 'my daughter on fleeing to the country in March, 1871, made me promise to write down for her each day all that I saw and heard. On her return to me one of the first things she demanded was to see this journal which I had kept faithfully. 'Have you it still?' asked the poet. 'It is possible that my daughter may have preserved it,' I answered. 'I must see it, I must have it to-night,' continued my host. 'But it is too late to send it to-night,' I remarked.
