The pulpit the preachers occupied was com posed of rails or fence boards. The grounds were illuminated at night by tallow candies placed in tin lanterns and suspended to the trucks of the trees. several hundred conversions. The campmenting that has been evolved during the brief period of half a century is a very different affair in almost every respect. It is still located in the vicinity of trees and water, but they are desired as matters of luxury and not for convenence. A delightful situation is desired. Attractive scenery is necessary to draw the alleged worshipers, who do not come from log huts and shanties in the country, but from costly mansions in tashionable cities. The "camp grounds" are conspicuous for containing no camps. In their places are costly buildings known as cottages. Nowhere and at no time is smoke seen rising from fires employed to cook food. The cooking is all done in the kitchen of the palatial hotel or the adjoining restaurant, where meals are served at a price that would have paid all the expenses for a week of a person who visited a campmeeting in the days when the institution was true to its name. The grove of nicely trimmed trees is lighted by gas or electricity. The seats are as comfortable as any found in a church or theatre. The pulpit is a very artistic affair. Trained musicians furnish the music. The preachers are scholars. They have clerical titles at one end of their names and college titles at the other They preach not the simple gospel that was once proclaimed in the woods, but a gospel that has been involved by sacred councils and theological discursions reopie do not make a practice of publicly confessing sins at campmeetings at the present day. They think the practice is demoralizing. They are never "taken with the power." To be thus seized would indicate coarseness and lack of refinement. Lake Bluff, Ocean Grove, Chautauqua Lake, and Old Orchard beach are all famous for their campmeetings held by the circuit riders of the last generation as the modern philosopher does

from the ancient monkey. The Proposed Congress of Churches, Hartford Religious Herald,

In response to a circular issued by the elergymen of Pittsfield, Mass., to the ministers of the different Protestant denominations, a meeting was held in that place June 18, at which a committee, composed of the Rev. J. H. Seelys, the Right Rev. Thomas C'ark, D. D., and the Rev. Joseph Anderson, D. D., reported, recommending that an organization be formed to be named "The American Congress of Churches," and that its object be to promote Christian union and the advancement of the kingdom of Gad by the free discussion of the great religious, moral, and social questions of the time, and that it should assemble at intervals of two years. Arrangements were made for another meeting to be held in New Haven in May, 1885. There is no doubt a deep and growing sentiment prevailing that the barriers that have hitherto existed between the different evangelical denominations were an obstacle to the progress of Christ's kingdom not warranted by real lifferences in sentiment; that greater toleration and a more co operative and united spirit in working to promote the essentials of Christian faith should provail. With such wise and judicious men as Drs. Seelye, Clark, and Anderson to direct its operations, such a congress may be productive of great good. To meet its object and secure the respect and co-operation it will need, it would seem necessary that this congress be composed of delegates who shall represent some ecclesiastical body and be responsible to them. Its

relation to, or field of effort in distinc-tion from that of the Evangelical Christian Alliance should be clearly defined. With the grand fields opening to, and the latent vitality is, the church of Christ, backed by the unfailing promises of God's word, there is afforded an opportunity for all the wisdom and spiritual energy of a congress like this proposed. An Augustinians Convent's Jublice.

The oldest British institution in Paris has celebrated its fifth jubilee. The Au gustinian Convent of Our Lady of Sion was founded in 1634 by the exertions of Pinkney, alias Carr. During a long period it received, as nuns or as pupils, members of the leading English Catholic families. During the reign of terror the nuns were prisoners in their convent, the inmates of two other English numeries being also lodged there with a throng of French women, about a dezen of whom only left the building for the scaffold. The adjoining Scotch college, where the brain of James II was last year discovered, was likewise full of political prisoners. During the consulate and the First Empire the pupils were necessarily French, and a little later on George Sand (whose grandmother and mother had both been prisoners there) passed three years in the convent, which she has graphically described in her memoirs. The pupils are still mainly French, numbering seventy or eighty, one attraction to parents being the facilities for learning French.

The Venus of Milo Changed.

Patt Mail Gazette, Visitors to Paris will be surprised to meet a friend with an entirely new face. Some weeks ago it was found that the floor of the gallery, which held the famous Venus of Milo, had so suffered from damp that immediate repairs were necessary. The statues were removed, and it was pre-No. 401 WEST ORANGE STREET, corner of Decaze. A fac simile in plaster was ac-

tually put up to see how the statue would look, but the relatives of the donor of the collection Decaze objected to sculpture being mixed with pictures, and another site had to be decided on. Moreover, the surface of the statue has been carefully cleaned, and the result is very striking. The face and torso are white, while the drapery remains a dull color.
