THE ELEMENTS. 6,000 ACRES OF GELIN BURNED. Terrible Heat, Hail and Wind Storm in Districts - Buildings Damaged and Crops Heavily Damaged.

St. Paul, Minn., July 22. - A destructive wind, rain and hail storm visited southeastern Dakota, at Carthage, near Ironopolis, a strip five miles wide was cut by hail. In Dell Rapids, 20 miles west of here, great destruction ensued.

The loss being estimated at \$200,000. The crops were badly cut by hail and telegraph lines prostrated. At a town 14 miles north of Carthage, the crops were blown down, and the roads were scattered over the prairie.

The loss here was \$30,000. At Sioux Falls there was no hail, but the wind did damage to the extent of \$2,000. Of the crops, corn suffered the most damage.

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
