The July Find that Henry Olphin Fired the Fatal Shot. Charles Bentley, the boatman who was shot at Columbia, at midnight of Thurs day, died at the county hospital on Satur day night between 11 and 12 o'clock. Coroner Shiffer was notified of the death, he empandled a jury and at 2 o'cles on Sunday afternoon went to the county hespital and held an inquest. Doctors McCreary and F M. MURDERED THROUGH A WINDOW.

A Wealnty Farmer's Eccentric Son Charged With Assassinating His Sister in Law. Saturday night in Spring Garden township, York county, about five miles from York, at what is called the Glades, Mrs. Adam I. Miller was shot through the body while holding her sick infant upon her lap. She will in all probability die. Suspicion points to Pius Miller, the brother of her husband, upon purely circumstan tial evidence. The shooting caused great excitament in the paighborhood. The excitement in the peighborhood. supposed assassin is a young man of 21 years, son of Jacob Miller, a wealthy and respectable farmer living in the neighbor hood, and has always borne a good character. He has, however, always been considered a monomaniae upon the subject of witcheraft, and has for years accused his sister-in-law of bewitching him.

Upon several occasions it is stated that Pius Miller has threatened his sister-in law's life, and so fearful has his brother been for the security of his wife that for some time he has gone with his wife, child and babe to his father's residence in the neighborhood for safety every night. On Saturday night, as usual, the husband passing between two ribs, penetrating the langs.

The assassin was not seen, but it was afterwards found he climbed to the window on a ladder and fired the shot while standing on one of the rangs. The hus band, who was in bed, immediately ran to his wife's assistance and gave the alarm, but the guilty person could not be found. Medical assistance was summoned from York, and the woman's injuries prononneed fatal. She lies in a dangerous condition, suffering great pain. Adam J.
