**A MUTINY SUSPECTED.**  
**STRANGE DEATH OF A SEA CAPTAIN.**  
News Extended That Captain Lewis J. Baker, was murdered by his crew.  
The more that is learned of the fate of Captain Lewis J. Baker, the Philadelphia schooner Julia Baker, the deeper the mystery becomes. Saturday afternoon Warner & Merritt, owners of the vessel, received the following dispatch from Key West: "We are getting the truth. Walker, the second mate, has been poisoning Captain Lewis. The crew states Captain Lewis is dead, seven days out. Will probably arrest all the crew."  
It appears now that Walker has all along claimed to be Capt. Lewis, but some of the crew, who are in jail at Key West, declare that when the schooner was seven days from New York the captain died, and Walker, who is described as the second mate, assumed charge, and sold 200 barrels of flour at Inagua for \$5 a barrel. A Key West dispatch also says that Walker had evidently arranged to sell the balance of the cargo at that point.  
Mr. Merritt said that there were several reasons why the statement by the crew should be received with great caution. In the first place, no man named Walker appears to have shipped from New York, and in the second place, there was no second mate on the vessel. It is possible, Mr. Merritt thinks, that the crew may have had some quarrel with the captain, and the mate were both put out of the way.  
Mr. Merritt telegraphed to Key West for full details of the death of Captain Lewis and for all facts connected with the affair. He also dispatched a special messenger to Key West with full power to assume charge of the vessel and cargo. The insurance companies interested have also sent agents to Key West. Mr. Merritt anticipates a full confession from some of the crew, but he is not at all sanguine in his opinion that Captain Lewis was murdered. It appears from later information that the man Rand, who was shipped as a mate of the schooner, is not a relative of Captain Rand, of the Troop.

**A MUTINY SUSPECTED.**  
The crew of the Julia Baker state that the mate was attended by Gomez, the steward, and Walker, the mate, for seven days after leaving New York. When the crisis came they gave him something from a bottle and he died three minutes afterward. Walker was arrested. Gomez led the schooner at Fortune Island. He said that he owned half the cargo.  
Walker told the crew after the schooner left the island that Gomez had stolen the money which had been realized from the sale of the flour. It is feared that there has been foul play, and further developments are expected. The supposed master of the schooner has been exhibiting considerable gold and trying to buy silence.  
**THE RECORD AGAIN LOWERED.**  
Maud S. makes the unparalleled trot of a mile in 2:09 3/4.  
Saturday was a great day at the Cleveland driving park. The race having interfered with the programme of the week the sport began at 11 o'clock in the morning and continued without interruption until five races were finished. The weather was pleasant, except a short shower at 1 o'clock. The track was in good condition.  
At half past 1 o'clock Maud S. was brought on the track, and after a little warming up William Fair, who was driving her, took her for the mile, and she gave her best performance in the smoothest conceivable manner, unattended by horse to urge her along, and made the entire circuit like a perfect working machine without a skip. She passed the first quarter past in 32 seconds, the half mile in 1:04 1/4; three quarters in 1:36 1/4, and the full mile, according to the time given, in 2:09 3/4. Three gentlemen in the judges' stand timed her. David Bonner, of New York, made the time 2:09 1/4; W. B. Farjeu, secretary of the Cleveland driving park, made it 2:09 3/4, and J. Cummings, president of the Toledo driving park, 2:09 3/4. Several watches in the boxes opposite the judges' stand marked 2:09 1/4.  
President Edwards announced that the time was a record, and that the handsome mare had made the fastest mile ever trotted.  
The mare exhibited no signs of distress after her unparalleled performance, and was led to her stable and attended by a groom, followed by a crowd of jockeys and admirers. She had had no work for ten days. Captain Stone is confident that she could easily trot the same track on Monday in 2:08 or better, and is more than ever confident she is the fastest trotter in the world.  
President Edwards telegraphed to W. H. Vanderbilt: "Allow me to congratulate you. Maud S. still reigns supreme; her record is 2:09 3/4 on a slow track. Before ordering her home come and see her trot in 2:07 or 2:08. We are all happy."
