Another company had previously offered \$100,000 for the same privilege. Mayor Edson vetoed the measure and an injunction was obtained restraining the aldermen from passing the bill over the veto. A dissolution of the board was obtained late last night and at nine o'clock this morning, the aldermen met and passed the bill over the mayor's veto and adjourned. Few except themselves knew the meeting was to be held.
