THE TOBACCO MARKET.

THE ORUP OF '84 NOW SAFELY BUCKED

greening satisfactorfly-New York and Philadelphia markets,

Trade continues quiet among lealers.
One lot of 200 cases of '80 leaf held by a city packer was disposed of last week at private rates. A lot of 50 cases of '83 was also sold, and we hear of about 200 cases of '83 chapging hands. There may have been a few other small lots sold, increasing the total to 500 or 600.

The sampling of the '83 oran continues.

The sampling of the '83 crop continues with satisfactory result, fully one half of the crop being sampled. Some fears were felt that the exceptionally cool summer would have a bad effect on the cured to would have a bad effect on the cured to-bacco, preventing it from heating and sweating properly; but so far as we can learn no damage resulted from this cause. The terribly hot weather of the past two weeks ought to be enough to quiet the nerves of those who hesitated to sample their packings for lack of heat.

Almost all the '84 crop of this and ad-ioning counties has been housed, and a better, or cleaner grop was never put upon

better, or cleaner crop was never put upon the poles. The excessively warm weather has caused it to cure rather faster than growers desire, but no bad results have yet developed. Two thirds or more of the entire crop is of the Havana seed variety, the greater part of which was cut early, and there are croakers who claim that it and there are croakers who claim that it was cut too early, and that therefore it will not mature well. Similar stories are annually circulated in the interest of buyers, with the object of inducing growers to sell at low figures. Last year's crop was denounced as a poor one and purchasers held off until late in the season and then bought up the crop at their own figures. No sooner did they get it into their possession than they discovered it was the best crop ever grown. Thus it was in the beginning, is now and Thus it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be—buyer and seller alike look out for No. 1. From present appearances the crop of '84 is an excellent one, and if

New York Market, From the Tobacco Journal. Notwithstanding the all prostrating heat a very cold wave seemed to have whisked around quarters where '83 Wisconsin Havana seed is being held. Instead of an auticipated rush for the new sampled "photos" of Sumatra, a somewhat clammy autipathy was evinced, and the virgin samples are virgins still; but then it was really too hot for people to plunge into serious calculations on expensive and somewhat thorny tobaccos, and, therefore, but one sale of high priced '83 tobaccos has been reported. A broker had sold 100 cases of '83 Housatonic Havana seed to a manufacturer. The price obtained was quoted at 34 cents. All the holders of '82 Housatonic Havana seed went into convulsions of joy. All the holders of other kinds of Havana seed saw in this sale the inauguration of a golden sive and somewhat thorny tobaccos, and, n this sale the inauguration of a golden wave. Personal inquiry corroborated the statement as to the sale; but as to price and name of buyer no information what-ever could be obtained. But, then, it had been said, 34 cents had been realized, and then everybody holding Havana seed was nearly—not wholly—ready to swear that this was the price received. This is again an illustration of how easily the market is

affected by the unsubstantiated reports New Fall Goods. the doubt, and hug the report of the price to his bosom never to let go of as long as For the past two weeks we have been busy he can help it. To add to the incongruity opening new and desirable goods in all deas the seller, has already gone into the Housatonic Valley to buy '83 Havaos seed crops. This, certainly, justifies the grow ers to ask higher figures, and tends to make the seed leaf business still more hazardous; but it also shows again that the purchasing of leaf in the country is built upon a bubble, that is, sell one year's packing of a certain crop at a profit, and buy the next year's irrespective of facts, figures, statistics and commercial principle. It does not matter that 250,000 cases are lying in the country ready for the market, and 300,000 or more about to be put into condition. It does not matter whether 10,000 bales of Sumrtra will be in the market within the next six menths. Nothing matters to the average lead packer but a sale of this packing at some profit. That propels him back to the scene of his success, unwillingly almost. Some weeks ago Wisconsin was swarming with prospective buyers of the '84 crop. They went there because they saw no obstacle in their way of selling their '83

erops at a profit, and in order to be in season for more victories, they laid their plans for speedy purchases of the tobacco yet in the ground. All of a sudden these cople have gone home; not because the obacco is good or bad or too high or too low. What packer cares for such triffes? No, because—well, because there is a cold wave about which I had the temerity of speaking at the introduction of this article

Considerable attention has been paid this week to the '83 Pennsylvania tobaccos, and sales numbering 700 cases are recorded ; these consisted principally of better grades, bringing from 12 to 16 cents. There is a fact which the reader will do well to take into consideration. The market has been scoured for fine—only fine—tobaccos. A maze of uncertainty is hanging over the condition of the '88 crops, no matter where they were raised. There is very little of fine to-bacco in any of the crops. This condition of things will last a very short while only. Manufacturers will now speedily determine what stock to secure, and,

therefore, a rush in the market will take place before long. Not wishing to preju-dice any particular crop, this matter must be left to the course of events. Reports of sales of 4 000 cases '83 Pennsylvania in Bremon have reached us; the price obtained is said to be about 8 cents. Such sales must be hailed with satisfac tion ; the price, low and unremunerative,

is sufficient to encourage sales for export if only the demand will keep up. must be rid of the enormous surplus of low grade tobaccos. In old tobaccos, especially '82 Pennsylvania, a heavy business was done, sales of 900 cases being reported. The quotations run from 7½ to 12 cents The total sales of the week in the market were :

Some of this stock has been sold, as well as a round lot of Housatonic '83 Havana. Dealers are now well supplied with signs stock of all kinds. well supplied with eigar stock of all kinds, hence ready to meet the views of buyers. A fair but not heavy trade has been done the past week on fair margins, and it is claimed improvement in business must fol

Sumatra still seems to be the first choice of some of our manufacturers, and they back their opinion by purchasing. Havana is full of activity if it has the

The work of sampling the new crop was interfered with somewhat during the pas week by the intense heat, but now that a cool wave has made its appearance, the work will be pushed forward more vig-orously that ever. That part of the crop already sampled gives ample proof that as a whole it will be a very serviceable one, especially the Havana seed portion of it. It has been stated by several parties that much of the broad leaf sampled so far has been very defective, but as yet we have been unable to see evidence of it. Of course, broad leaf is not the fashion, and this probably the cause of its being looked upon as defective tobacco. From what we can learn, there is much of this variety fully up to the best crops raised for many

years past.

The opinion bas been expressed by some that sampling had been begun too this year; that tobacco was not in fit condition owing to the cool summer through which we have just passed. When spoken to on the subject, a membe of a large inspection firm in this city said: "I think a great mistake has been made by many in sampling so early this year. They have not taken into consideration the fact that we have had little or no hot weather during the summer, an that the tobacco has therefore not had sufficient time to go through the sweat. notice that much of the tobacco, especially the fine, is in a very soft condition, and should not be sampled for some time
