THE OLD, OLD STORY.

WATWARD GIRL'S SAU ENDING. Why Herena Fills Committeed Spicial-Her Remains Lete Among the Unclaimed in the City storgue, In the paculiar twilight which suffuses

In the paculiar twilight which suffuses damp stone chambers a gas jet burned in a verdigrised bracket Monday in the New York morgue. Its light fell upon a young, girlish face, pallid and shrunken, but showing traces of considerable beauty, and with temples and neck covered by a mass of light hair. Decency had cast a covering over the stone slab where the body lay, but the face still was exposed in the light. No one had come to look upon the dead; no one had claimed the body for interment. Only official duty, represented by Coroner Merkle and his assistants, had entered the place. When they ants, had entered the place. When they left it science had determined the cause of Bertha Bilk's death to be poisoning by

phosphorus.

She had died at daybreak on Wednesday morning. Dr. Leon, of No. 404 Lexington avenue, called in haste to a dying ington avenue, called in haste to a dying girl's bedside, and discovered Bertha in the house of a professional nurse, at No. 1,135 First avenue. It is a little frame building, consisting of a basement, two stories and an attic, which, with a twin structure, stands back from the street. Mmc. Kiene's name is on a plate beside the door, with an aunouncement of her profession. The neighbors knew little of the woman, and although a dressmaker and her two daughters who occupied the accord floor were known to be respectable, hardworking people, gossip had had its fling at Mme. Kiene. It was only Tues day morning that Detective Campbell had been sent by Captain Gunner to the house to inquire into its character, and he then had told Mme. Kiens that no shady practices would be tolerated in the precinct The woman had assured him of her dis position to do nothing illegal, and said that she had in the house only a girl who had come to board with her some weeks before and was employed in a concert sa Icon. This, it appears, was Bertha Silk, whose condition Dr. Leon saw called at once for an aute-mortem investigation. To him she admitted that she had a child a month ago which died at birth, but she would say no more about herself.

The physician notified Captain Gunner, and the coroner was sent for. The girl's statement was brief. She said she was tired of life, and that on Saturday last she had soaked three boxes of matches i

water and swallowed the decection.

Mme. Kiene said that the girl had come to the house two months ago and engaged her services, saying she wanted to stop at the house. In three weeks' time her child was been dead. Six days after the invalid had gone away and staid out till eleven o'clock at night. Eleven days later she had gone to a piculo. Last Saturday she was out in quite fate and on Sunday morning she was comiting freely. She ate her meals, however, but on Mon-day her appetite was gore and she was able to swallow only a milk punch. On Tuesday evening, against her wishes, Dr. Leon had been sent for.

THE OLD STORY. When Bertha expired yesterday the police took her case in hand again. Of the girl Mme. Kiene protessed to know nothing beyond what she had stated, but a servant in the house admitted that the dead girl had a lover and that he was the keeper of a saloon on First avenue, near Sixty second street, named John Herman Knoope. At that Detective Campbell recalled meeting this very man in company with the dead girl and Mme. Kiene at the Word collarenm on the occasion of the Liederkranz pienic three months ago Her relatives were next sought out Bertha has a father sugaged in the dry goods business in Eighth avenue. Marti Silk is a Hungarian, who came here twelve years ago, and was followed a year later by Bertha and her step-mother. There were three girls and four boys in the family. Of the latter two have already developed a suicidal mania. On the 14th of June, 1882, Henry Silk shot. and killed himself in Central Park. On the 9th of March, 1884, Joseph Silk

jumped off High Bridge into the water, but was rescued, and on account of in-sanity was not held responsible at court. HEADSTRONG AND WAYWARD. Bertha had always been headstrong and wayward. She frequently quarrelled with her step mother, and ten years ago, when she was only thirteen years old, she went away to live out as a domestic. fits and starts she has since returned. But she always had trouble with her step-mother, and was summarily bundled out For eight months she has not been seen by her father. Then he heard that she was margital to a liquor dealer on First avenue Six months ago her sister Rosi, who is the wife of a tailor named Martin Stone, of East Twenty fourth street, saw her pass ing. She called to her. Bertha came back. She was fashionably dressed, and told her she had married a wealthy liquor dealer in First avenue, near sixty second street. She said she wanted for nothing. Mrs. Stone asked her to bring her husband to them, so they might see what he was like. But she went away, and they

saw no more of her. All through yesterday the body of the girl lay at the morgne. But no one called

Mr. Silk, her father, was asked what he intended doing. "Ach, my frient," he is reported to have said, "mine son Hainry, be gilled himselef like dot, to: gost me so mooch I can go nodding." Mereiful Brother Adolph is reported as saying : " She vas a vild gert and vonda" behave herself. It's her own vault. Vot vill I do? Nodding. Vill I go to see her? Not at all, my good ser." Brother in-law Martin Stone had enough to do to look after his own family.

So the body of the helpless Bertha is likely to pass away among the unclaimed at the morgue, and be lost among the countless papper dead of a great city.

Mr. Thornton went to business promptly, and everything passed off quietly until a messenger boy ran in with

a telegram. Thornton was in the height of 'Riebard III.,'' and with his sword swinging above his head was shouting wildly, "A horse ! A horse ! A kingdom for a horse !' when the boy rashed in on the stage and insisted on the tragedian suspending operations to sign for the dispatch. The andience cheered lustily at that point. After the performance Thornton and his manager started for the hotel, but as they left the theatre, they were set upon by a mobs who threw rotten eggs at them, and they had to fly for safety. The mob followed to the hotel, and a lot of hoodlums made threats of further violence

hoodlums made threats of further violence toward Thornton. Mr. Thornton was put n an upper story room, where he remaine all night, the proprietor of the hotel assuring him that it would be hazardous for him to attempt to take the train at night. The next day he was conveyed privately to the station and came to Atlants, where he will rest a few days before again taking the read. Mr. Thornton is a brother of Col. M. E. Thornton.

FAUTS ABOUT IRRIGATION

From Col. B. W. Wilson's Address to the Massachusett: Heritogitural Society. It is very evident from common experience that injurious droughts are increasing in frequency, and the careful consideration of the subject will develop the following simple but significant truths:

That whatever the cause of this deficiency of moisture, whether from the destruction of the forests or not, the simplest and cheapest remedy at the bands of the agriculturist is irrigation.

That whenever a supply of water can be obtained, the cost of pumping it will not exceed three cents per 1,000 gallons for an amount of 10,000 gallons per day pumped o a beight of 50 feet above the surface of the water, which cost will include the necessary repairs and depreciation and on the cost of the necessary fixtures and reservoir; this is less than onesixth the price charged by the city of Bos ton for metered water, and considerably less than the price charged for irrigation in any place where the present generation has constructed the works and seeks to make them pay a remunerative income. That should a brook or spring not be available, there are but a few places where an adequate supply may not be obtained

by sinking wells. That the cost and arrangement of the work will vary so much with the different locations and circumstances that schedule of cost can be given, but the cases will be rare where \$750 to \$1,000, discreetly expended, will not furnish ample water for the irrigation of fifteen acres of

That the preservation of a single crop, in a year of unusual drouth would reimburse the whole expense.

That the positive assurance of immunity from the effects of drouth should in-

duce all cultivators to accure at once the means of irrigating their lands if possible. That besides the security afforded in the case of an excessive drouth, it will be found that water can be used very profit-
